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SECRETARIES OF THE ATHENIAN
BOULE IN THE FIFTH CENTURY

Since Penndorf and Ferguson compiled lists of Athenian Secretaries in 1897 and 1898, many new names have come to light. Consequently a revised list should be of value as a supplement to the Fasti of the editio minor of the first volume of the Corpus, especially as the Corpus index, strictly limited in scope, does not contain much of the material which has been gathered together in tabular form in this paper.

Wherever possible, I have compared the inscription itself with the transcript given in the Corpus, and in a number of cases it has been necessary to deviate from Corpus readings, both as to single letters and as to the length of lacunae. Occasionally, it has been possible to give more precise dates to inscriptions. Finally, a re-examination of the evidence has made it possible to identify a few of the secretaries with men of the period prominent in Athenian public life.

In the following table the fourth column gives the number of the tribe of the secretary as determined by the official order. The sixth column gives the official number of the tribe in prytany, while the seventh column gives the number of the prytany when the secretary named in the second column was in office.

²It is worth noting that the formula of this inscription is of a stage that is transitional. The Salamis inscription, I.G.I², 1 which is dated at the end of the sixth century has as an opening formula εδοξεν τῷ δῆμῳ [Επὶ τῆς θεοληπτωτῆς] The β which is the last letter on the stone may be the first letter of an archon's name as the Appendix of the Corpus suggests, instead of βουλῆς If the reading βουλῆς is correct it must be observed that mention of it is brought in in the closing formula as a mere device for dating, not with full credit to its power as in later years. I², 4 of 485-4 has the closing formula ταῦτ' εδοξεν : τῷ δῆμῳ ἐπὶ Φίλοκράτος αρχοντός ; τὰ ἐν τοῖν λιθοῖν ταύταιν. The inscription with which we are concerned here is the first to give the name of the secretary. Its formula is εδοξεν [Επὶ βουλῇ]
καὶ τῷ δῆμῳ : ὅτε Παραβάτης σύραμμάτευε.

In I.G.I², 16 we have complete for the first time the formula εἴδοξεν
Τῇ Βουλῇ καὶ τῷ δῆμῳ Ἀκαμαντίς [ε]πρυτάνεκε, [Ο]ντατηπτός
εγκαρδιεύει, Ἐπικυρῆς επεστάτη, Δέων εἰπεῖ.

The Boule is indeed its full importance as a law making body. The prytany system has been set in motion, and the prytanizing tribe begins here to be named in decrees. The name of secretary is given exactly as it appears in later times, i.e., without the δῆτε which introduces I.G.I², 5. The epistat and the proposer of the decree are both named. In short, one sees here that the whole machinery of government has begun to function. Wilhelm dates I.G.I², 16 about 465. But in the light of constitutional history the conspicuous position accorded the Boule seems of especial significance. Is it not possible that both I.G.I², 5 and I.G.I², 16 may date after the reforms of 462 which overthrew the supremacy of the Areopagus and restored sovereign power to the people? The formula of I.G.I², 16 would warrant such a conclusion.

The name Παραβάτης occurs only twice: here, and in a list of those who fell at the naval battle of Cynossema in 412-411 (?) I.G. I, 950, l. 152.

1. This name is restored in the Corpus as *Αντίδωρος*. That is a name that occurs twenty-two times but the name *Αντίδοτος* exactly fills the lacuna. The latter is a less common name, appearing only six times, but there is an *Αντίδοτος* of such prominence that he might well have been secretary of the Boule. Diodorus, XI, 91, mentions him as archon in 451-0. Whether ex-archons were eligible for membership in the Boule is not known but if they were *Αντίδοτος* is a conspicuous possibility. To cite a parallel case, Drerup suggests that the *Διότυμος* who was secretary in 432-1 may be the same who served as archon in 428-7. 2. Penndorf, *De Scribis Rei Publicae Atheniensium*, I.B. Hirschfeldi, Lipsiae, 1897 identifies this *Αρχέστρατος* with the general mentioned in Thucydides I, 57, the proposer of C.I.A. I, 27, and the treasurer of Athena of I, 237.

3. According to the new Corpus there is no evidence that *Τιμόθεος* was a secretary of the Boule. See Dinsmoor, "Attic Building Accounts" A.J.A. 1913, p. note Another secretary in Ferguson's list must be discarded: *Αγνόδημος*, dated c. 454, was not a secretary but epistat of I.G.I., 25.

1. Drerup identifies **Metagēnēs** as the architect of the Telesterion at Eleusis, citing Plut. Perik., 13. There he is mentioned as **Ξονετήινος**, which would fix his tribe as that of **Kenponis** following Drerup's suggestion.

2. **Kritidēs** is mentioned as secretary in four inscriptions but only in I.G.I², 295 is his name given with patronymic and demotic.

3. Penndorf identifies this man with **Xarías Διασάδης** P.A. 15340

4. Drerup identifies **Diōtymos** with the one who was archon-in-

428-7.

5. P.A. does not have this occurrence of the name. It appears only once in P.A., from Arist. Knights, 1287. This can be no other name than **Oīónifos**. The letters -ονι- are very clear and all other names which contain -ονι- are too long for the space.

6. The name **Auteinōnys** appears in a grave list of 425-4, I.G.I², 949

1. Drerup and Penndorf identify *Xapocadηs* with the general of Thuc. III, 86, 90. Drerup also cites Diod. XII, 54.

2. The lacuna after the name *Kallistratos* in I.G. I², 310 is exactly filled by *Ευπέδου Ογθεν*. *Kallistratos* was general 418-7, I.G. I², 302, obviously the same man as the Hipparch, *Kallistratos* *Ευπέδου* who fell in Sicily in 413. Prosop. Att., 8143; Paus. VII, 16, 4. For the reading of I.G. I², 302, see Miss McCarthy's paper. It is quite probable that Gallistratus the secretary was also general and Hipparch, and I have restored the name accordingly in I.G. I², 310.

3. For the date of *Σκότας* see West, "Methone and the Assessment of 430," A.J.A., 1925, p. 440. Penndorf identifies him with Prosop. Att., 12735.

4. Drerup and Penndorf identify this man with the ambassador to Perdiccas, I.G. I², 57.

5. It is impossible to tell whether *Aiyndis* is correctly restored as the name of the prytanizing tribe in line 1 of I.G. I², 63. If *Aiyndis* held the prytany when both decrees were passed, the secretaries are the same.

6. Careful scrutiny of the stone establishes this name as ... λυκός. The most probable restoration is *Επίλυκος*, and since Epilucus the son of Teisander, uncle of the orator Andocides, in the very next year was sent as ambassador to the King of Persia, Andoc., III, 29; I, 117; Prosop. Att., 4925, the identification of secretary with ambassador is not at all improbable.

7. The Corpus assigns this decree to 424-3, with a note to the effect that Kirchhoff had assigned it to 426-5. If the latter is right, I.G. I², 324 shows that the prytany of Kekropis in that year was the second.

8. Drerup suggests that Aristophanes, Achar., 602 f., refers to this Phainippos. The decree quoted by Thucydides fixes the prytany as the sixth or seventh, IV, 118.

9. This man is not listed in Prosop. Att., and there is no other man of that name known.

In I.G. I², 302, the blank for the name of the first secretary of the year contains seven letters, not eight as given in the Corpus. Consequently I.G. I², 302 and 370 are now in agreement. See Miss McCarthy's paper.

A payment in 416-5 was made for the expedition to Melos in the prytany of Ainatis. Since the number of the prytany contained six letters, we can restore Ηέκτης ὄγδοης or ζεντης. The expedition took place in the spring, while the sixth prytany would fall ~~had exeketiken~~ in February. Thus Ainatis held either the eighth or the ninth.

Prosop. Att., 434 and 435 takes the position that the Αἴγρωνίδο[ς] of 103 is a different man from that of I.G. I², 104, citing Köhler, Hermes, XXXI, 140. Penndorf believes they are the same, op. cit., 192.

4. The name appears in Ferguson's list as „Ἄεις 429-84
5. Identified by Drerup with the Cleigenes of Arist., Frogs, 707.
6. Dr Leonardos has a penciled note in the Museum copy of the Corpus suggesting the demotic οἰναῖος as much more likely than οἴηθεν. This is one of the names that has the demotic after ερεχθίατεν. That order is not usual with secretaries of the Boule. Of the twenty seven whose names are followed by demotics three (perhaps four) have it after ερεχθίατεν instead of the more common order of name, patronymic, demotic. Drerup identifies this man with the Philippos of Arist. Wasps 421, and Birds 17pp.

1. This name has been erased with such thoroughness that no letter can be deciphered. There is no secretary of 409-8 whose name fits the rasura of 18 letters.

2. This Δωρόθεος was probably the ambassador to the King of the Persians in 409. Xen. Hell., I, 3, 13; Prosop. Att., 4589.

3. Drerup identifies Euclides with the Archon of 403-2 and with the member of the Thirty, Xen. Hell., II, 3, 2, of that name.

4. Prosop. Att. suggests that this man is the Κλέαρχος listed in I.G. I², 398, Αγρουλεύς. Cf. Penndorf, op. cit., p. 115.

5. Ενεύρης was written first and later erased to make room for Κράτης. The erasure was not complete so that the first six letters of Κράτης are quite clear.

6. Drerup suggests that Lysicles is the proposer of I.G. I², 128, also the secretary of the Τάγματα in 417-6, I.G. I², 244, 245, 269, 270, 302. If this is correct his name and demotic are Δρακοντίδος Βατρύδεν Att., 11907.

7. Polyaratos was παρεξδρός Ελληνοτροχίων in 410-9, I&G., I² 304; Prosop.

8. This name appears in Ferguson's list as - - - εύς.

9. Penndorf identifies this man as the son of Thucydides, son of Melesias, Arist. Ath. Pol., 28, 2, 5; Plutarch, Nicias, 2.
