

Nov. 6. Wednesday
Left Athens at 7 PM. by the Express for
Salonica with Col. Capps, Maj. Black, Maj.
Barnes + B.H.H. Delayed by workbooks
on line, night on train

Nov. 7. Thursday
Arr. Larissa ~~at 11 AM~~ ^{at 11 AM} Lunched on train
arr. Salonica at 7 PM. Col. Capps B.H.H.
go to house of Gov. General Adonidis to stay.
Rest of us scattered in rooms hired by
Serbian Commissioner of A.R.C. I stay in
same room with Maj. Barnes.
Maj. Black Barnes + I dined at King
George Hotel with Maj. Farnham + others
of Serbian Com.

Nov. 8. Friday
I moved to new room assigned by
Serbian Commissioner of A.R.C. in house
of a Dem. May 13 gens. Very clean & comfy.
but no light ~~anywhere~~ ^{anywhere} at Governor
General's. We go to Tribunal in St Sophia
for St. Demetrius Day.
Tea at Am. Consulate General
Maj. Barnes Sr. Black + I surreally field
at King George Hotel.

Nov. 9 Sat.

We all lunched at General's quarters today. Gov. Adonides is to come on a small steamer tomorrow for Kavalla & the Senior Commission of A.R.C. has promised us 25 tons flour & other supplies for E Macedonia.
B.K.H. & I lay in supplies for personnel for trip

Nov 10. Sun.

Lunched at Gov. General's again. At 4 P.M. we left Salonica on board SS. Hellepontos with ca 35 tons of supplies. Mrs Gladwin of Senior Commission came with us. The Gov. gave us one of his own automobiles to take with us on the steamer for use at Eastern Mac. Also local commandant for us.
Nov 11 Mon

Violent head wind makes put in for the day at Porto Kouphas a very beautiful little harbor with fjord like entrance near end of middle promontory of Chalcidice. We went ashore & had a good climb in the hills (Dr Black B.K.H. & I)

Nov. 11 Tuesday

Arr. Kavalla ca 3 PM after stormy night. We are put up in houses of American Tobacco Companies. The Col. the Barnes & Beach at Gary Col. H. B.K.H. & I at Melachanis Col. House. Very comfy

Nov. 13 Wednesday

A warehouse is given to us by mayor & we begin unloading stuff from boat. Rain. Butsh are very busy & helpful.

Nov. 14 Thursday
more unloading

Nov 15 Friday

Unloading of boat finished tonight but a good deal of flour had to be put into Butsh warehouse for the night also some cases. Our transportation depends entirely on Butsh who hangs on very cautious & kind about giving us flour.

6) Nov. 16 Sat.

Steele + I went to Drama in Ford van with Maj Saunders. Col Caffo + Maj Barnes also went to Drama to buy buttons + thread for their sewing circle. Dr. Black + B.H. busy setting supplies to warehouse + making noise.

Steele + I stayed in house of a friend of his in Drama.

Nov. 17 Sunday.

Looked about Drama in morning. Col Caffo + Maj Barnes left for Xanthi along with Mrs. H. D. + Mrs. J. Greek Red Cross to help deported Greeks get back from Bulgaria to their homes.

In afternoon Steele + I rode out to Komista (or Cronista) with Mr. Prohres Djima recommended by Brington to help us. We reached Cronista in cattle hrs. Djima has a large farm there (rented from Monastery) an old worn cetera + dilapidated building but with a comfortable room + beds for Steele + me + a dining room with a small coal stove in it.

Nov. 18 Monday

Conferred with paretos of Cronista + asked him to prepare us list of poor people of his village who had nothing to eat.

Rode to Cherephian (Tsepia Navy) 20 minutes distant + conferred with paretos + symbolon here to same effect.

(Between Cronista + Cherephian in a deep ravine is a vein of fairly good soft coal. Anyone may dig who wants it. A company is said to have applied to Govt for concession to exploit it.)

Rode from Cherephian in 1 hr + 5 mins. to Kimp Kioy (Kioukier) + conferred with paretos + aldermen to same effect as above. Also saw representative of three villages destroyed by the Bulgars. Sent to Provost + Lekkoikia to make same request of them.

In afternoon rode 1 hr to Rodolivos the largest of the villages on N side of Mt. Pangalon. Saw mayor + his council + made request for list of poor.

Spent night here at house of Joachim.

8) Nov. 19 This Day

Rode $1\frac{1}{2}$ hrs north to Angista - small + unprepossessing village. Saw the paraderos here + asked for list of poor. All are poor but for the present with our limited supply of food we must try to get only the most worthy cases.

Rode $\frac{3}{4}$ hr. east to Vitasta pleasantly situated little village. Lunched here. Saw paraderos in same manor as above.

Afternoon we rode $1\frac{1}{2}$ hrs back to Cromista.

Nov. 20 Wednesday

Six ox carts with supplies arrived today from Kavalla. We unloaded them + put goods in storeroom.

Lists also began to come in + we commenced an Angout ticket for families included.

Nov 21 Thursday

Our first day of distribution. We began with $1\frac{1}{2}$ oks flour per person but when all lists had come in we found we had to reduce to 1.5ke per person.

Classification of uniforms

- I. Polished wps. (subneohyria)
A. Red or black monochrome hand polished. No slip.

Nov. 22 Friday

Distributing all day. chiefly flour. Also a few blankets + shawls + a little milk.

Nov. 23 Saturday

Distribution finished today. Our lists include total of 572 families + 2066 individuals. Almost everyone of the families sent a representative + got some flour. In the evening came a few from dugouts near Lakhoviria + we gave them double portion of flour as we had no more blankets. They had come 6 hrs journey to get a little flour.

Nov. 24 Sunday

We left at 10 + rode back to Drama. Got in late after all British boats had left. Finally got onto in Greek postal ferry + went down to Kavalla after dark without lights.

Nov. 25 Monday

Saw ship flying American flag in harbor this morning. Returned out to the Hellesponts bringing McIninch + supplies from Mitsifera. We got a new warehouse from the Mayor + began unloading. The 6 boats which left Cremona Friday have not turned up here.

Nov. 26 Tuesday

Miss Gladwin left today returning to Salonika. McIninch refused to run the sewing circle + I am unable so I closed it up for the time being to be reopened when there were personnel. Col. Capps came back from Bulgaria today bringing on to Athens.

Nov. 27 Wednesday

At 9:30 AM Lt. Cobb + Filby arrived today from Athens. 9:30 AM + Cobb went on in British boat to Drama in PM bound for Xanthi.

Col Smyth (British Base Comm) has telegram from Pideagatch that 75 carloads of refugees are on way to Xanthi. He furnished us a truck + we shipped ca 3 tons wire. Supplies to Xanthi via Drama in PM.

Col Capps arrange for two trucks per week to Drama Mondays + Thursdays to transport our supplies for Bulgarian line.

We get Metachromo House for our HQ. + move in.

Nov 28 Thursday Thanksgiving Day

Shipped a long of supplies for Xanthi via Drama. Got 5 new horse carts from civil governm to replace unusable carts. They left at noon for Cremona. Col Capps left by motor for Salonika with Filby driving.

Sat Nov 30

Met Lt Welch at British Base

in Palestine with Palast. Expt. Band.
sent off 10 military carts of
flour for Cromwell.

Sunday Dec 1

Went out in P.M. with Welch
in truck lorry (Lt Mair also) to
Dikelitash (fallen stone) ca
14 km. out. to investigate mound
just off left of road opposite cluster
of houses. We found it is a good
prehistoric site. Much pottery bits
in ground. We picked up quantity
of various kinds: (A) hand polished
or burnished monochrome
black ware. (B) Black ware

We let get two heads of figurines one perfect (male bearded like caricature of Friedman) in burnished black technique & several torsos.

I got one head in buff technique + one torso of female figurine.

This looks like a very good site & has apparently much painted pottery. At the top of the mound is the ruin of a medieval or later building. The foundations are partly excavated.

Tuesday Dec 30
 Stele & I were taken in a
 Ford to Pragi. Here as found
 horses waiting for us & with
 an officer as escort set off
 at 11 AM for Crumista. The
 officer (name of Libendes) was
 formerly Spoup ap'os at Palochari
 and Nikishan & wished to visit those
 two villages enroute. It was a
 cold rainy day but we agreed
 to go by the route with the
 understanding that we should
 arrive at Crumista in the evening.
 Libendes promised this expressly.
 We reached Palochari in the
 rain & sat for a while in a
 house there eating our sandwiches.
 Heard tale of woe from wife of
 former school master (changed by
 the Bulgars)

Later we rode on in light drizzle
 to Nikishan over mountain trail
 where we were obliged to walk
 part of way leading on horses.
 Finally reached Nikishan at
 4 PM in rain. Lt. Libendes wished
 to stop here for night in house
 where he lived as Spoup ap'os
 but we reminded him of his
 agreement to get us to Crumista
 by evening. He admitted to
 agree to go. Distance said to be
 2 to 2 1/2 hrs. We left at
 4.40 PM. From now on it

rained steadily somewhat more than
 a drizzle. We were wet cold & un-
 comfortable. At 5.30 it was
 dark and by 6 it was black as
 pitch. We couldnt see the ground
 beneath our horses. Also the road
 was very muddy & wet. We splashed
 through mud & water from 6 to
 11 inches deep. We couldnt see
 & guide & left our horses as they
 waded. The way seemed interminably
 & there was no light visible anywhere
 save from Pragi far away across
 the plain. At last our horses lost
 the road too & we found ourselves
 skidding through the mud in a
 flooded field close by the bank of a
 foaming stream. The sensation of
 being lost revived Stele & me from
 our gloomy disgust at the situation.
 Our journey had now become an
 adventure. Our Greek friend
 however fell into a panic from
 cold & discomfort. He reproached
 me for having led him out on a night
 like this. I remarked that he shared
 the responsibility for having taken
 us off the track to visit
 Palochari & Nikishan. But that
 was an accomplished fact said he
 we'd already done that. There's
 no use going back to that

I rejoice "well" it's also an accomplishment
 fact that we left Nekochee + that
 we're here now lost in the mud. We
 got to make the best of it + find
 the road again + shelter as soon
 as we can. He judiciously admitted this
 fact. We dismounted + trudge back
 through the mud leading our horses
 until at last we found the road
 again. Then we went on until after
 a time we finally saw a light in
 the hills to the left in the
 direction where ~~the~~ might be.
 But we couldn't find the trail
 leading up in that direction. The
 crossroad being marked by two
 ruined Turkish springs we remembered.
 We spent an hour hunting for the cross
 road but in vain. The best we could
 do was to find one spring also ruined
 but this was obviously not the cross road.
