March 11, 1901-

D. Rest of morning drawing -
Graf in afternoon.

12 - D. Still working on the pen
and inks. Museum in after-
noon helping get photos ready -
Later took flock and went for
a fine walk around by the
Zaphron -

13 - Pottier lecture. chiefly on
correspondence of Byz. art &
early Ionic motives. Did also
some attic vases and went to
small room with fine collec-
tion of Acrop. fragments. D.
Museum again after lunch
took flock with us. Then to
tea with the Perrys.

14. D. Museum in fore. and then
for tea and walk with Mahel
up Kephissia road. Flock must
too. There was a fire and we
went on the roof to see it.

15. Went for a picnic with Miss Troay and Mr. Sautzo. Drove to Chalandri and went beyond to the woods where we had a fine restful day - Then back to the village where we were entertained by a pleasant friend of Mr. S. (Κορνηάρα) she has a fine daughter Sophia who showed us her dowry. Stopped on the way back to see a bee farm. M. in eve -

16. Pottier again on relation of painting, terracottas, etc. to sculpture. Rest of day at drawing have finished three large ones. Mr. Seane to tea and then we took a walk to the top of the hill beside the stadium - In eve. to school party at the R's. British school there too. ^{Francis} Played games and danced -

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stayed very late. We are making Miss Baldwin's life a burden to her these days.

17. Lazy morning, and then went to hunt up Mary Balie's friends from the Augusta Victoria - Did not find them but was surprised to run across Miss Ogden. Went to Grand to see the girls in late am. After lunch we went to Mabel's and I played hours on the piano and we sang. My part of it was particularly choice. We had everything we could think of. Late L. I went out to golf, bad scores. Mabel and Miss Katina drove out for us.

Eve in Psychas -

18. D. Expected the Hamiltons so spent most of the day chasing around for them. Did a few errands for Cutan

trip and waited with Miss Cutting and Miss Smith until they came. Had them all for tea, six of them. Navi's husband is fine, reminds me of George Lamb. They are all very jolly. Had open meeting at school but the 14th left so late I didn't go. I got in for the end of Mr. Weller's talk. All worked home together. Packed in eve.

19. Had visitors early in am. to say good bye to us. Actually left for Cuba on the John boat about noon. Mr Bassett and Mr Steunmance were with us. Trip began pleasantly but it got very rough and we had a fearful time. Slept in our clothes in the upper cabin.

20. Boat still pitching and

rolling horribly. Reached Canea about eleven and went ashore for something to eat. Had more rough weather all along the Canea coast, but slept a good bit after dark. Reached Mesolochion about 10:30 and had a rough time landing. Were not able to get into Miss Cotagis's though we banged on the door half an hour. Finally put up at the Siron where we slept like tops. Were weeks after the boat.

21. Went around to the English house where we found Mr. Marshall and where we were delighted to be taken in. Everything fine and comfortable. He went off to the museum but we loafed and waited well all day. Reading the

Belle of Toorak by Homoury. Mr. Lawson the British Vice Consul here for dinner - ^{walk around} rampart.

22. Went to museum which is very near here in the Turkish barracks. Did not think Miss B's things were very promising but set to work at once on cataloguing. Found museum nice, dry - clean to work in and the people fine about getting everything you need. Back in fore. at same thing. Sorted all the things out in groups of where they were found - and began to describe them. Mr. M. showed us all the other things. After tea, took a walk outside the wall near the sea. Began to read the King's Mirror by Hope.

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23. Felt a week after the trip so stayed in bed all day and rested and read both my story books. Up in time for tea.

24. Celebrated Sunday by doing nothing, had a fine lazy time reading papers and magazines. After tea went out to hear the band and had a fine walk in the little garden while they were playing in the square. The band is fine, and so is the scenery. Mail came.

25. Very busy all day in the museum and things are getting on finely. This is a fine comfortable place -

26. Museum acc. - pers. - got the catalogue finished and compared a number with the other things. Took

the walk around the ramparts again in the other direction but the wind almost blew us off.

27. Begun on the fragments several sacks of very dirty things - at it all day, but made good headway - A horrible day, cloudy, windy, dusty and no temptation to walk - wrote letters.

29.28. After lunch we went out to Knossos, and such a ride as we had. Lida had a very stubborn mule and I had a balky horse which would not budge unless treated viciously - we bounced and bumped out - and took almost two hours to get there. They have made great progress since last year, most interesting were the large

western court and rooms with pithoi and cistae. Mrs. Evans we found charming, also met Mrs. Sjö and Mrs. Wachsmann. All had tea and saw the new finds in the house, then went on to Mrs. Hogarth's dig and got a number of fragments - it is a fine place out there.

28. A lazy day doing nothing. Lida stayed in bed and I read to her, among other things Shelley's "Hellas" and several shorter poems. Hellas doesn't compare with Swinburne's Ode to Helios. ^{washed outside} town.

30. Didn't do anything in the morning because we all got talking. Finished up the fragments in the little museum in afternoon and had a walk -

31. Being Sunday we did nothing - for a change. Had a walk around the ramparts - after luncheon but were too lazy to go out to the music as the weather was rather horrid. Mr. Stogart was here for dinner - and we liked him tremendously. Had great fun teasing him about his two maids in pink.

April 1. April fool. Found them washing the museum and everything very horrid and messy but we spent the morning in the big one and the afternoon in the little one. Mr. Stogart lent us the British School Annual which was a great help. Begun to write our article but did not get on very far &

felt discouraged about it. [11]

2. Still washing. Finished up the little museum and sorted out a few Misc. fragments to take to the big museum. Got a great deal done today and much help from Mrs. H. in the large museum. ^{did work outside} _{10 min.}
3. Finished up our work in am. ready to go, but went back after luncheon for a farewell look at things. Worked out after tea, expected the boat to go but it doesn't get off till tomorrow.
4. Kept waiting for the boat all day and had a farewell walk around the town and the wall. Boat left about eleven but - we must on at nine - Very rough and the small row boats were nearly

swamped. Boat was fine and steady and we had a dandy room.

5. Up late and had a nice trip. Five of the English officers were on board. Got to Pinaros about 4.30 and drove up. Stopped to see Mabel and after dinner went to see Miss Boyd who has just come and is on the point of going to Cuba. She was furious with us about the races so everything is in a fine mess. Sat up late composing a letter to her.
6. Went around town doing errands, got money etc. In p.m. went to see Helen Bishop who is in the Evangelists with a bad leg. Then to Mrs. R's for

tea.

7. Went early to talk over plans for Acadia with the Perrys, then took Mabel & Miss Hoag whom we picked up to see the procession to the cathedral as it was the 9th 24th process - independence day. We had not happened to see the state carriage before and everything looked fine, a huge crowd and a long procession of school boys. In p.m. Mr Marshall came for tea and read us Sokrat and Rustum. We had dinner very early, so in order not to starve we had a tea party at about 10. ^{went to see Miss B.}
8. W. Cannot get the fit for work but did some on

my thesis. After lunch we took Miss Bishop to drink around by the Zaphiron, Acrop etc. Later went to tea with the Perrys.

9. No lesson, so worked home all am. Lunched at the R. and I and I went out to golf with Mr. Brown who played our best ball. Went back to tea and then to the library.

10. To Phyle for the day, all here but Katica, and Mrs. Dragounis and the two girls. It was a hard trip, very hot and long and almost everyone was very kind. Made our horses trot, with sad results. All went to bed in a delapidated state. Letter from Miss Boyd.

11. D. Stopped a minute at the hospital, then went to see how Mrs. Dragounis was and had a nice little talk with her. Weather is fearfully hot. Took Miss B. for a drive to the cemetery. Miss Rhinehart, the head nurse went with us. Jack was here to tea to talk about Miss Boyd. Dined at the hotel, a party of twelve, Brauquets, Richardsons and British school were. Lida had Bobby and had an awfully nice man named Crace. Mr Frost had six glasses of Benedictine, he has a strong head. Played games and fiddled and had lots of sport.

12. D. How thesis about ready

to copy. Lida's friends Miss Palmer, Bowen and Mann have arrived, and asked us to dinner but we were too tired. Agnes was up after lunch, then Mr. M. came to play golf but we did not go, then Mr. Koro and Mr. Bennett came. We even saw a little of the Good Friday procession from Mabel's.

13. Tired, and just went to get some paper to copy my thesis for it is about done and I am tired of it. Took rather a day off as we were to go to the midnight service. Mr. Souza got a roof on the plateau and asked us all, as we had a fine view, though it was not as impressive as I expected. The noise has

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been fearful for two days, and I look is scared to death. Got back at one and had supper in Mabel's. Johnny Dragounis was the only man. Stayed till about two.

14. A fearfully windy day and I did not get up until twelve. Went to Mabel's after lunch and had a hot time. Later Mr. M. and Mr. Frost (pill) came and afterwards Mr. Wells. Dined at the Argenteum with "the Palmers". After we came back Agnes came in to April Fool us but was surprised to find us here.

15. D. Began to copy as hard as I could until four when we took Miss Palmer and the others to Daphnia for a drive, and marched

on nearly as far as the water. In eve Agnes came up.

16. Pottin lecture on Paraguay, met with Mabel. Got our new shoes which are a great success. W. in after noon and then down for tea. Went to see Miss Slack who leaves in the morning for two weeks. After dinner met to see Mrs. Kendrick who is at the Grand and was enthusiastic about excavations.
17. Have decided I must give up Dorothy's lessons as there is so much to do. Went to see Miss Bishop and worked the rest of the time.
18. The Palmers here for tea, Mrs.

Karo also here, his sister is to arrive soon. Afterwards Jack came and stayed till it was time for him to dine out.

19. Lunch with J. at the Minerva but didn't think much of it. Sorry he leaves tomorrow. Went to the games in the station with Deborah. Fine time.
20. We were going to have a lot of jokes for W's birthday, but as Agnes was away they all fell through. Did rounds and called to say good bye to the Palmers who were out.
21. Fine lazy Sunday doing nothing in particular.
22. Went to Cyprus exposition in pm. with Mabel and Deborah, got a green bowl and some nasty sticky candy.
23. Spent most of the morning getting ready for the trip. Took

a nice walk around by the
Zabkion after tea.

24. Forgot what did.

25. Started off for Arcadia at
6 all alone as L. was ill.

Read "Beautiful Song" on the
train and met Mrs Kendrick
and others at Coimut but at
Dialofto I decided to come back.
Glad to get here, knew it would
be horrid weather. Find out.

26. Took a good rest. Went to
the school a little while
and afterwards L. and I had
tea at Chrysokis. The others
got back at night.

27. Miss Leach came late
in the afternoon and of-
fered me a place at V. C.
but I don't know whether to
take it or not.

28. Sweet morning, but late
in pm. to grief. L. broke her

record.

29. Took my thesis down to Miss
Leach. Had ice with the Perrys
then Miss Dewar was here
for tea. Had not seen her
for a long time. Keeping busy
reading for sculpture work.

30. Mrs and Mrs Perry and Agnes
were here to tea. Went after-
wards to Rousoopoulos to get
coins but no one was in.
Had a nice drive with the
Mr. Perry.

May 1. Went around and
got some coins. In pm. met
Miss Leach who wants
my thesis re-written which
is a great bother as I had
supposed it was all done.

2 + 3. Writing on the revision
of the thesis, L helped me
at last with it. Others have
gone off on their Rese.

4. Began the copying which is a fearful task. Stopped at four and went to R's. for tea, then out to golf with Lucy and Dorothy. Wrote late.
5. Sunday made no difference wrote all day long and very late again. The girls had their cousin Antony to dinner.
6. Wrote hard all day, my paper is giving out and being a holiday there is no way of getting more. Went a little while in am. to museum to see the new things again.
7. By desperate work finished copying at lunch time and was a worn out rag. Read my loud duke by Thomson in pm. to celebrate. Foolish.

8. Put the loathsome thing in the mail (9.75 postage!) then to say good bye to Helen Bishop who leaves for Italy.
9. Decided to take a couple of days off for my head is used up. Yesterday read "Dracula" most idiotic tale, today began flames by the Green Carnation man, very interesting. Mrs. Drayman came to tea which we had very late on the terrace. Afterwards did some very good experiments and got very mad at Mabel but she didn't know it.
10. Mrs. Kendrick and Miss Acker to tea. Miss A. a little slow, but Mrs. K. up to all the fun going. Went on the roof for sunset and dressed her up in

my golf coat. Went after dinner to Mrs. Dragoumis's where we had one of the most wonderful evenings I ever spent in my life. She read to us from her dream book, many things which can have only one possible explanation. She writes most beautifully, we went home very late and I have never seen a more interesting personality.

walked far along the beach
& sat on the rocks and took
pictures and fiddled a lot.

19. Went to school in a.m. for
Mr. P. to take our pictures
but they didn't come out very
well. Mr. Mrs. Waldron
(Tringwood) came while we
were out & asked us to tea
at the Angleterie, so I must
found them very pleasant
but as all their plans were
made we couldn't do any-
thing for them. Met the P.'s
who came on the roof to
see the sunset, then we
dressed and dined there & had
a farewell bat for the
season.

20. Library all day, a.m. & p.m.

21. Library again, a great deal of reading to do on my things.

22. Went to the circus in the evening with the Perry's - Lucy, d. couldn't go so Mrs. Forman took her place, the circus was great - fun. A fine bicycle rider and lonely dog who played ball. Had ice afterwards.

23. Lit. with Mrs. or Herman school all the time. Went in p.m. to Rephessia to see Stock & incidentally Cutina and her mother who went out on Saturday. Found it - lonely out there - it is very hot in town. Had tea & took a nice walk & sat in the garden which is delightfully shady.

24. Went in p.m. to say good

bye to the Perry's. Took them a little vase with a koukoubajra on it which I got this am. at Frau Helmke's. All went to Jannabis for a last ice, Mr. Hill too, and then went to Piraces to see the boat off. Felt terribly to have them go and I think they were sorry too.

25. Museum again, deep in photos which Mr. W. is to do when he gets back. Mr. Hill & Mr. Soutzo here to heal a long time) it was too hot to go for a walk.

26. Did some necessary sewing and dine at the P's. Family, Sears, Powell, Dr. Carr & Lythgoe. Mrs. R. has been quite ill but was better. Put out on the balcony all the eve. A fine moon.

27. Went on a beautiful picnic to Chalandri but as L. did not go she was much missed. Mabel, Miss Euphrosyne, Mrs. Dragoumis, Despina & I. Had a lovely day in the woods, and a beautiful rest - change. Had little to eat but were in good spirits. Took our hair down like wild Indians. Mrs. D. made pictures of feet - "Maydalm".
28. Down in the picture taking business again - work at school in pm.
29. Museum. German School are getting lots done.
30. Germ. Sch. again in am. in pm. met to see Mrs. Richardson and then to Mrs. Dragoumis who was out. Mabel & Despina met to Delphi, Wed to Friday.

31. Have thunderstorms every day now but it is unnatural kind of weather for this season. German school again. L. and I had a rest late in pm. Girls came back & me up here after dinner, both look much better for the trip.

1. Dined with Miss Hoag. Mrs. Sautz was there too & we went for a drive down by the Thessalon - Acropolis to the Zopifion where we heard the music for a time.
 2. Museum. Rain every day at about noon or 5 o'clock. One of these days Mr. Kastriotis showed me the Herms but together all ready to set up & the heads from Agnia, all very interesting.
 3. Library. Mrs. S. came in pm.

to arrange about a trip to Pyrgos.
5. Mus. am. Drove to Pyrgos to
the farm of Ellen Amalia a
dear little place like a mini-
ature castle with a tower -
big courtyard - neat gardens
around, also a fine shady
tennis court. The nightingales
were singing all the time. It
is a charming place, took
a walk afterwards to a
fine grove on a little hill
- on the way back got some
pomegranate blossoms which
I had never seen before.

6. British school. Mrs. Karo was
here for tea, but goes away
soon for another trip. Went
afterwards to the hair dresser.

7. Museum. Went for tea at
Mrs. Dragounis's and she
kept us to dinner. Had a beau-
tiful time with all the

10. Lu had all day with fever
- malaria. Dr. says it is
not very bad.

11. In bed all day, out on sofa for dinner. Miss Stephens made up for tea.
12. Got up, went for a little drink in p.m. and was down for dinner.
13. Went to the museum in p.m. Flock lost and found.
14. Museum as usual, very hot. Went in p.m. to see the Richardsons, all out but Mrs. R.
15. Very hot day and did not get much done. Mabel and Deshaie came back from Poros. L and I went for a lonely drink to Phaleron and sat on the rocks.
16. Still wasting, went very early to the school to say good bye to the R's. Felt quite strange to have them go off.

17. Usual work in morning in museum or writing or tea. Went in p.m. on the Acropolis and in the little museum.
18. Wrote in am. very hot.
19. Lunched at the Grande Bretagne with Mr. Kars, Santos and Volgraf, Mr. K's Belgian friend, very charming. Had a good time though P. is dope. Stayed last night till 12 and was nearly dead - After tea which we had at Mabel's I had a lonely drink to Phaleron with her.
20. Mr. Kars came in p.m. and showed us his Cretan pictures, also said good bye, for which I am sorry. Went in eve to Mrs. Draymanis' and got caught in a thunder storm.
21. P.M. in museum working with Mr. Volgraf. Mr. Volgraf

came and went home with us. Had picnic supper up here and Mrs. D. came. Came to be on the terrace but too cold. Got out there afterwards in eve.

22. Museum in eve. felt rather lumpy, my brain has collapsed. ^{also my penicillin.} Were to go to the circus but it rained.

23. Nice lazy Sunday, did my mending. Vollgraf to tea and then we went on the Acropolis for sunset and had a fine time.

24. To Court on the early train. Mabel went too. Had a beautiful drive out, a fine breeze and no dust and the vines very green. Found things in the little museum very satisfactory. Had a horrid lunch but it was too hot to eat much. The excava-

tions were like an oven so we did not stay long there. Had delicious tea with Mrs. Veritassi the prefect whom we met on the way down. A nice trip back, but we were tired and big.

25. Spent eve. going around town doing errands for people - incidentally for ourselves. Got a beautiful Eozover suit. Very hot. D. went to Mrs. - I had tea with Mabel - then went with Despina to her house - sat in the garden.

26. Spent all the eve. in mus. trying to hurry Rhomaidis's man who took showers for pictures. Went late in eve. to get my repaired jacket. Circus in eve, good fun. Johnny Dragoumis took us - Poutzo turned up, also Mrs. C

who sat by us. Went for ice after
27. Finished the photographs
all the museum work, than.
beams. P.M. to Kephissia,
tea with the Euphrocles in
a smut garden, then a drive,
then to the hotel where we
dined with Mrs Psyche and
Cateria and the intolerable
nuisance, in the garden.
Home by fine moonlight.

28. A day off, we didn't do
anything but have a nice
lazy time. Read the De Villiers
claim - all here and loving.

29 Mother's birthday. Nothing in
particular.

30. Did not go on today's
steamer but had a nice
rest. Weather is getting very
hot. The girls had guests
for dinner and in the
evening and I got very mad

- at Mabel.

July 1. Worked very hard all
day trying to finish our
t.e. article but it is too
hot to work every minute
did a few errands in p.m.
Are having fine moonlight
nights and generally are
on the terrace.

2. Went up to school to say
good bye to Mr. R. and
took him some Egyptian
cigarettes but he had gone
on the early train and
we did not see him.

Writing as usual planning
to get off on Sunday.

3. but for errands, anyone jacket
all right at last. Short drive
afterwards. Cateria and
flock for dinner and after-
wards Mr. Knitch took us
on the acropolis to see the

moonlight.

4. No firecrackers. L. in bed with a touch of bad fever. Had a gay tête-à-tête dinner with Dr. Wilhelm.

5. L. still ill, we have given up trying to finish. Took back to the museum the various things we had out.

6. L. better. (Dressed up in my egoone costume for the girls) weather still very hot. Went late in pm to say good bye to Mrs Dragoumis. Quarantine

vs. Constantinople and our boat won't go till Monday or Tuesday if it touches.

7. Got most of the packing done and the room in a fearful state. L. was down in Mabel's room

for a little while. Mr. Ghika came in pm. to say good bye. After dinner Despina came up.

8. Have to go via Italy and leave Wednesday on second train. Got tickets etc. L. and I must for a little drive and to pay the Mr. etc. went to the school - got some story books, everyone has left except the Con. Stopped for the girls with Mrs Sotiriades - had a little drive later.

D. came up and read some other poems to me.

9. out to get provisions and do last errands, finished packing etc.

10. Left on noon train. Mabel & Slarko came to see us off. Catiua arrived most unfortunately and kept D. from

going. All in the house seem
sorry to have us leave. Mr.
Gmitch brought us beauti-
ful flowers. Train was not
hot and journey to Patras
was comfortable. Small but
good room on Italian boat.

11. Reached Corfu quite early
but did not go ashore.
Had a severe thunderstorm
while we were in the
harbor. Meals on deck very
pleasant.

12. Up early at Brindisi,
customs easy, extra express
deadly. On train for 26
hours without sleep in
dining car & had to get out
at 1 am to change. Lack
of comfort. Fortunately it
was fairly cool but it is
dilly work.

13. Arrived at Turin and got

a room in the hotel and
got partly clean and had
something to eat. Afterwards
looked around the town a
little but it is not a very
interesting place. Left at
7.30 and had dinner on train
& a compartment alone. We
would have slept well if they
didn't wake us every hour
for tickets, frontier, or empty
berths.

14. Grabbed a bite at 6 am
in some small station -
Paris about 10 but we stayed
in the train and rode
around the city. Felt very
dirty when we saw the other
people. Rest of trip very com-
fortable. Easy crossing Calais
Dover and glad to be in
England. It is a clean place.
London at 7. Went to Hotel

Victoria and had dinner
sent up as we were too
dead to move. Glad to be
in a bed again.

15. After breakfast went to
see about a boarding house.
Like the hotel but we are
too poor. Went to 5-Bedford
Place where we had been
recommended and got a
fine big room. Moved in
before lunch but first
went to look at and Brown
Shipley's. Rested early in
p.m., and after tea rode
on top of a bus up Bedford
street as far as the Marble
Arch. Went to K.O.P.

16. Went down Regent St. to
get some gloves but we got
tired soon as it is hot
and sticky. In p.m. had
a fine drive around Regent

Park. London is a dandy place.
In ev. Kate and Miss Rehofield
came to see us, they live only
a few doors away.

17. Went to the Museum which
is close by, and spent most
of the time in the races
and terraces. In p.m. took
a long bus ride thro Picca-
dilly, Sloane St & Chelsea
over so far but had to come
back for dinner before the

one of the nicest things we

28. Desecrated the Sabbath

naps.
- Aug 1. Smooth - much warmer.
Ball in the evening. Fine morn.
- 2. Smooth and warm, concert
in evening rather slow. Helped
take up collection -
 - 3. Weather rather unsettled
shows in evening or night
but boat keeps very steady -
 - 4. Chuck in air, nice &
short. Fine day; saw a

fine moon rise, very red.

Rain had in night - was nearly flooded. Voyage has been very comfortable, nice room, good food - nice servants.

5. Passed Nantucket light ship about 4 pm. Captain's dinner in eve.

6. Woke up about daylight - and saw many lights on shore. Went by Sea Gate about 5. Lay off Crescent Club - docked about 8.

Horrid day. Mother and Iot met me, and Mrs. Kin was there too. No trouble at customs but a great waste of time on board. Came right to Sea Gate, here 11.30.

House is fine and comfortable and good fire too. May McDermott and Mrs. Wood came over and then we

went there. May has a smut house.

7. Big trunk arrived and took all morning to unpack.

Sail into the Hallocks in p.m. to Rockaway, fine time.

8. Went to Brooklyn and first saw the apartment which is great for this little. Then bought a rain coat and golf shirt, lunched with Grandma and did some errands. Home tired. In eve to Crescent with May where we met the H's and Charlie and sat on the dock to hear the concert. ^{supper at} 4. club.

9. Went on the Echo with the Hallocks to the Crescent - played golf, rank back but a nice place. Lunch on board. All met to the Rutherford in eve and

did stunts - saw the cake walk.

10. Left late - spent rest of am. on the piazza. In pm sailed all around Harbord Bay twice in the Jimmy.

11. Birthday, beautiful gold links from mother, money from dad. Bathing in am, a big crowd and played ball in the water. Late in pm. went out with the It's but could go far as the boat was dope and we had to take the little one. Row down -

20. Still unpleasant, things all fixed but hard to study tho' show 4 fat myc. books. Walk in p.m. after it cleared. Louise Robbins to dinner.

21. In garden before church. Fine sermon by Puff about helping other people & doing good hard work. Walk in pm. with club up on Cedar Ridge, fire up in the woods. Alice Nairn back & had her broker here. Then called on Mrs Gillespie.

22. Mrs D. is going to take A most of the time. The best thing that could happen. Worked on Hall in am. Then had B but only gave out some prose and ordered books. Crammed up some history appropriate for Lys. Then to Soc. meeting. Dined with Mrs Cooley - more history. Am to take the C course as Mrs M. has too much to do. Please help me & the class.

23. Am. reading for C course.
