Mar. 7 This will be a very queer diary for  
it has to be made up for nearly  
two weeks. The vile boat nearly finished  
us, and any writing was beyond the  
limit. So here I sit in the railway  
station at Giardini waiting for the train  
& racking my brains for our adven-  
tures.

Feb. 21. After endless postponements we  
reached Palermo early in the morning &  
was out on deck buttimes but we were not  
able to get off for hours. It rained at inter-  
vals but the harbor of P. was splended with  
its headlands. Lib came to meet us in a  
little boat & at last we got through customs  
etc. & up to S. des Palmes where we had  
temporary rooms on front of house. Fine  
hotel, everyone tried to make us com-  
fortable, but we were pretty rocky. Lib &  
decided to fly around with Kate and small

we could. All except Father went to Museum, lovely old place with courts, & the Selinus things which it was great to see. After lunch drove to Duomo, fine outside, much junk inside, emp. tombs very gorgeous. Then to Cap. Pal. which comes up to the hillside though there was little light as it was pouring. Then to the boat landing, terrible afternoon & a nasty little rowboat to go off it. Started keto off, then stopped at a Tea Room & then to hotel & hot tea. Didn't bother to unpack much.

22. Holiday in some parts of USA. Fine day took parents to Duomo, Cap. P. & Eremit with its lovely garden & cloisters. Got a little motor & went up Mt. Pellegrino, magnificent views, then to Tgeia for tea, lovely situation, stayed till sunset. Too tired to do much in eve, but there are dances nearly every night.

23. L & I spent most of a.m. in Museum, divided bet. Selinus & the vase collection upstairs which are not so much taken individually, but very important for connections from geom. proto-Cor. etc. right on. Afternoon to Monreale, perfectly gorgeous though it was blowing & showery & very cold in cloisters. Should like to spend a whole day there poking quietly around. Tea at a nice little place with lovely view.

24. Wonderful day to Segesta by motor, fine Fiat, splendid driver, great scenery. Much fun about the donkeys. Temple is most impressive, not good light for pictures, & wind very strong. Carpet of green & flowers inside are lovely. Lib & I climbed to theatre, splendid & a magnificent view. Wonderful & desolate situation. Could write endlessly on the variety of our drive, wilds, villages etc. Back very

late, due to helping other motor with us.  
25. Family wedding day, 29. All took life  
very easily in a.m., trying to get rested  
& letters caught up etc. Tried in p.m. to  
see Martorana (not open) so took little  
drive to Villa Cirilia & Giard. Inglese. Then  
all hot tea at my Tea Rooms.

26. Lik - I went in a.m. to see the churches  
we could not get into yesterday, so  
we had got a fine view of Martorana  
campanile from some steps opposite.  
Much brick in it & all in a mess, but  
the old parts are splendid & so are the  
mosaics. Liked St Cataldo very much  
with its simplicity, domes, & effect  
of space though so small. Some  
interesting capitals (see Warrn). Went  
again to take some pictures of exterior  
of Duomo as light was very good. Saw  
the crypt which is extremely interestg

sarcoph. of Walter of the Mill, etc. Stopped  
on way back & had hair washed. In p.m.  
drove (horrible road) to S. M. de Gesù for  
the view which was magnificent,  
giving the other side from Mt. Pellegr.  
A very nice monk showed us around  
& gave us flowers. Cable tonight that  
Aunt Annie had died Feb. 15.

27. Started off for Taormina on the  
10.20, a magnificent ride along the  
coast & a gorgeous day for it. A splen-  
did succession of headlands, like  
T. Imereze, Cefalu etc. & glimpses  
of Lipari Islands, very blue water &  
on other side orange & limestone  
groves & mountains. Only drawback  
was that dust fell so rotten - had  
an hour or so at Messina & then  
beautiful along coast until dark.  
Rather late at Taormina, those

lights we saw up above Giardini.  
Gard welcome at San Domenico which  
is a fine hotel & we had nice rooms  
here - I had 12 at first - afterwards 11.  
Fine view over the garden. Glad to  
be in room after our busy day,  
but first as it was a lovely moon-  
light night I went up the  
one neat little street of the town  
to the theatre, hoping to see it, but  
they do not open it in the evening  
so we came back to the garden  
& had a view of Etna from there  
instead.

28. No one in much of a hurry to  
get up, & we loafed in the garden.  
P.M. Lib & I went to theatre &  
spent most of the afternoon, it  
comes up to all the pictures  
we have seen - has just as

fine a view in the other direction  
from the top. We climbed to the  
very top at first - (see ENH) and  
from above the arches got splendid  
views, then sat in the niches for  
a bit, then went to custode's house  
& little museum & he took us  
to a higher spot for more of a view.  
Back for tea. Bridge in evening.  
Mrs P. found a very delightful friend  
of hers, Mrs Orr here & we all liked  
her very much & saw a lot of her.  
As Father still felt miserable &  
could do little but sit in garden  
they decided to cut out Syracuse  
Mar. 1. Had a fine time poking in  
the shops in the morning, lots  
of lovely Sicilian work. Lib &  
I left night after lunch for Syra-  
cuse and had a beautiful trip

right along the coast, most of the  
time with splendid views. Dark  
when we reached S. Went to Estranguis  
on the harbor close to Antusa  
fountain, lovely view - balcony.  
Food not up to San Don.

Mar. 2. Started via Antusa -  
around the corner to the Museum  
which is simply splendid (see  
Guida, Cat., & notebook). L. told  
me to see Ori who was very cor-  
dial - told the guard to show  
us anything we wanted. She had  
been promised to ask for a paint-  
ing in an inner room which  
you reach through the room with  
the archit. t. c. s. that are not  
generally on exhibition. Fine cat  
here - we had a splendid man  
who had helped excavate & told

us lots of things. Then we did the  
prehistoric collections & took co-  
pious notes & a few sketches. It  
was a treat to see the things I had  
read about so much at Per & others.  
Stayed the whole morning, then  
went across to Duomo the ancient  
part of which is very impressive,  
but the type of mind which  
can make it with all sorts of  
hideous baroque etc. is beyond  
me. Both inside & outside (in  
the wall) the columns are fine.  
Under the pavement of the st.  
on N. side was the great source  
of a huge number of Syr. finds.  
Arranged to take long drive in  
p.m. - got a pair of horses, went  
first along the barren ridge  
to Epiphane, forlorn & bleak ex-



left for the beautiful blue an-  
mons. Good remains of the wall.  
The fort was splendid, we went  
over it fairly carefully - got  
some good pictures. Situation is  
magnificent. There is amphitheatre,  
<sup>atrium of Hieron</sup> piscina (Norman church)  
theatre which in itself is fine  
but loses effect because of the  
horrible new factories etc. you  
see from it as you look to the  
harbor. But there some time -  
then went to quarries, East of  
Sion - etc. Could not stand the  
idea of going to the other quarries.  
Somehow S. got on our nerves, I  
realize what a magnificent site it  
was - what a brilliant history it had  
- all the famous men that were  
there but ~~it~~ is a constant effort

to remember that, I couldn't bear it  
- kept thinking of the Athenians, who  
had no respectable reason for being there.  
Anyhow it was frightfully depressing  
in spite of the lovely day. We got  
back before tea time, searched for a  
place, had a horrible time - thought  
the modern inhabitants detestable -  
the city most sordid & unpleasant  
except on the sea front. We did have  
a gorgeous view over the harbor.

3. Went again to the museum  
which is a rare treat. Should like to  
spend a long time there, it is one  
of the kind that should be worked  
over "mich by inch. Before that we  
went to T. of Diana (or Apollo) most  
impressive early Doric, part of  
foundations & some columns left.  
Left after lunch what a beautiful

trip back, seeing by daylight the things we had missed on the way down. Glad to reach T, that eve.

4. After running around, we were glad of a quiet morning. Had a nice walk in p.m. down hill around by a convent, after we had gone to see the little Roman theatre in a back street. Glorious views everywhere - went to a fine place for blouses etc. and got a beauty with Sic. work - like gal - 2. Such a nice woman, had heaps of lovely things. Passed villa of Mr. Putnam where the orkies had been to tea on Friday - He came to tea with us - is a most delightful and genial soul, full of fun. There was to be music in the Gt theatre, but the moon was too capricious, and with showers spoiled that.

5. Went in a.m. to Mrs Putnam's garden, a perfect paradise of a place all terraced up, and topped by a round temple. Adorable flowers - heavenly views. Went through the house beginning with the kitchen, ending with the room that was made out of a tomb - a music room. Poked about in shops, had tea at old India, with some extraordinary music, some compositions by CP played on a terrific piano. Bridge in eve.

6. Garden or shops in a.m. Again to the place where we had bought the things on Sunday - b. got - lots of lovely table things. Either today or yesterday went to Mrs Hill's workrooms - got many nice things. Tea at Eng. Tea Rooms, Dress and ourselves. Packed in eve, for fairly early start.

7. Failed to leave such a beautiful place. Left the others comfortably settled. Long trip to Girgenti, though we were very comfortable - the route was beautiful. Changed at Catania where we sent a wire to ~~Bob~~ for his birthday. Ride through center of island supposed to be rather stupid, but we did not find it so. Lots of charming fruit but left when very late - had a long sleep on the compartment seats before we reached Girgenti, about 11.30 - jolted along in an old cab to the Temples in the wet.

8. Lovely morning, gorgeous view from terrace outside room, over the garden - down slope to the ridge on which we could see 5 or 6 temples with the sea beyond. Drove

back to the town where we went first to Museo (see T.C.I.) small, but with some interesting sarcoph, vases, archaic Apollo etc. The town is all on a slope so there are only steps instead of streets across it, - to get to Duomo we had to go away around the edge. Town itself is picturesque and rather unusual, magnificently situated. Fine campanile, but mod. restoration has not been very successful - whole effect is poor. Chief interest is the Phaedra sarcophagus which was much finer than I expected - very old in certain parts. Thrift of work varies, but in long side with Hippolytus - hunt. Then to see Norman door of S. Giorgio - to S. Maria dei Greci built over old temple, showing columns inside - then we went down a dark hole

- saw how they were incorporated in  
n. wall, with temple steps below.  
(See plan in CT I p. 255). Got a few post-  
cards - back for lunch. Set out in  
good time - went to S. Nicola, reaching  
it by a path through the garden,  
gothic porch, set-out. Inv. andae, good  
interior, old pieces used. Had red  
woman also showed Orat. of Phalaia  
- parapet w. Corinth. cornice - a few  
old fragments around. Then down  
hill to T. of Zeus, very fragmentary  
but we took pictures of great lying  
on ground. Heaps of ruins very im-  
pressive. Then through a charming path  
to T. of Castor - P. which is quite as  
attractive as its pictures - is situated  
near the sea. Back to see T. of Herae.  
which they have begun to set up  
again. Also near a little near

17  
by but nothing very important, is  
mostly houses. Then on to Concord  
- Juno, fringed around inside - out-  
side, wonderful temples in grand  
positions. Back for tea on terrace.  
Found it impossible to get to Selinus  
except by motor at ruinous price -  
9. Up in time for 555 to Palermo, as  
we had to go roundabout. Fine trip,  
wet when we left, but clear before we  
got to N. coast so we decided to get  
off at Termini Imerese - go to Cefalù.  
Fairly decent connection, waited about  
an hour. At C. left bags, annexed  
a native - went to Duomo, which  
is very fine both inside - outside.  
Mosaic splendid. Went around it  
though it is rather crowded in. Then  
started up through goat pastures to  
the prehist. remains - it began to

blow a wild gale & pour a deluge,  
struggled along under umbrellas  
a rare old climb, went very fast.  
The remains at top are splendid &  
worth any trouble - rain stopped  
for a little while. Then slipped  
down again without damage, were  
well soaked but got some tea  
before train time & got our things  
dry on way back to Palermo which  
we reached in time for dinner.  
Had wired for a room - luckily got  
one. Told S. Maruccci about Trapani  
& he gave us a letter of introduction  
to S. Ragusa.

10. Left at 11.15 - had a long but  
very beautiful ride, by the sea a  
good part of way to Castellammare  
& then inland southward. The  
views were glorious, a fine day -

Thrilled to see it all along w. coast,  
Marsala, then the islands, then Mt Eryx,  
& Trapani jutting away out. It was  
still only about 5 o'clock and a  
beautiful afternoon, so we decided to have  
a try for the mountain. Here begins  
such a tale as would take hours  
& pages to write, but I can stick in  
enough to remind me of all the choice  
events. The man from the Centrale met  
us & we gave Sig. R. our letter &  
asked if we could get a motor to  
go up that night. Much telephoning  
& finally puff puff in the street,  
& there appeared a choice vehicle, a  
little red Ford, probably a delivery  
wagon by trade, 2 little chairs stuck  
in the back, a large important  
man brooding the chauffeur & he  
arranged about taking us up, though

we had no idea who or what he was, but he went along. Stunning drive along side of mt. & then up & up by zigzags, red hot engine etc. Wonderful views, like pictures we had seen like Hobbys' description. Arrived just at dark & climbed up thro' town, tried Minerva but it had become a school, then Modern, small & simple but everyone must kind. Very damp on top, flower pots like those H. tells about. kept well bundled up for dinner & found our escort had a place laid for him. Jolly meal - in middle of it in came a fine looking man in a plaid & as he left our man said he was the chemist from whose place he had telephoned, so I knew it was Compare Berto & sent to have him

called back & we fell on each other's necks & he stayed all the evening & we talked endlessly. The other man was Arcari the alternative to whom M. had written the letter. Had a very joyous time.

11. Thick mist when we woke. Had gone to bed in nearly all our clothes as it was so damp & chill. Could hardly see across the street, it rained off & on during a.m. but we paddled out. Berto took us to his house & we saw the children & had chocolate & he took us all through the place, though his wife was ill & we only saw her a moment. Pictures of H. - Butler. B is a charming host & a delightful man. Then we went to Balio & castle. The town is all built of grey rock,

streets all paved & clean, houses mostly around courts, so it is plain along the streets. Rain let up now & then & we went to the castello & saw the wall of Minos & the med. buildings & the later castello on the edge & the Balio garden & then to Duomo, which has a fine porch. Sun came out at intervals & views were ravishing through the clouds to the blue sea & the islands & Trapani below. Got some pictures of Duomo, went inside & then back for lunch which B. had with us. Went afterwards to see prehist. walls which are most interesting, & got several pictures. Finally came off a gorgeous day. Splendid drive down, then branched off the

other side & saw Aceri's new villa, then back to T. by road along the coast. Molto cattiva with mud, no guards, & we were unkindly sights when we arrived at station. A. put us in the train & we settled our accounts, very amusing about paying for the motor, as it was his own. Gloriosa along the coast until dark, but it took nearly all the time to Castel. veterans to clean off the mud. Boy from the Bixio met us & took us up. A regular provincial hotel, huge saloon for our room, only ext. high dining room. Incited in our having a huge dinner about 9.30. Very cold, but there was an electric heater in the room. 12. Up in good time for train to Selinunte, took our lunch with us. Fell in with many Italians returned from USA. At

S. had a lovely walk along the coast path to the part where Acropolis is. Very fine situation - Saw small ruins first but nothing much, chiefly a waiting room. Then went to most of the temples, minor but impressive. Then to the chief street, fine broad one, full of lovely flowers, wild pansy etc., leading to one of city gates. Walls magnificent, intricate system of several walls, round bastion etc. Overlapping arches. Day had been very fine but became overcast & the pictures did not come out. Lunched on some bread in the street while it was still sunny. Too wet in low ground to attempt necrop. Left plenty of time for other temples but it began to rain before we reached them - we had to take shelter as best we could

in nooks of the ruins. Got very wet. Finally reached custodian's hut and bathroom. Showers visited the 3 temples. Back to Palermo that night after decent connection at Castelluzzano. Found family had arrived from T. Magnificent sight.

13. Glad for a day in which to get rested clean, unpacked etc. Went again to museum. All had tea at Castle's.

14. Horrible foggy fulness here except that we left on boat for Naples & had a magnificent sail out of the harbor. Not been shed well on our journey by everyone - Boat very decent & had a good sleep.

15. Dull when we arrived, then began to pour. Hotel people got us off nicely. First rooms had funny bathroom so are to change when possible. Very damp - dismal weather but hotel



as nice as ever. Cleared in p.m. - we had a walk, then tea at Mrs Middleton's. Went to Troca in evening, first visit to S. Carlo. Opera very good, fine orchestra. Ballet before made it very late when we got home.

16. Took family to museum but did not keep them too long, chiefly Pomp frescoes & sculptures. Our permesso had come from Mr Stevens when we got to N., & we also captured them for the whole party for the new year at Pompeii. Spinazzola was not there but an old ticket man was able to issue them. Drove in p.m. to San Martino, gorgeous view & a very interesting place to see. Fine motor drive up & back through Orsillipo. Roads under repair, now very bad - Moved rooms, good ones on 25-27 corner.

17. Off on 10 o'clock electric for Pompeii. Glorious day - devoted whole time to new excavations so as not to tire the others. Splendid old custode took us about. Hide, and they have done a lot more in the garden behind the last house on right as you go from gate. Family delighted with it all. Lunch at Suisse, & I returned & went to A forum & Doric temple etc. Back by train, 1 hr. late & very full. Do not advise that again.

18. Decided we'd do only day trips as family too comfortable to move - did odds & ends. I had a walk in p.m.

19. To Sorrento on the boat, fine day - little Tramontano man took us in tow. Glad to see Jim & Dee again, though T. has got rather thinner - Went Mrs' a beautiful orange grove & then to

linen shop - bought tea cloths etc. I got one for M's birthday. Back to lunch at T. - coffee in court yard, then returned to shop - bought clothes, new net ones mine with blue - white. Mrs P got one - L. too or three. Great org. of it. Beautiful sail back. All delighted with place - would like to stay here.

20. Lord went to Mues. - did the two prehistoric rooms, very damp - dismal in cellar but a lot of the things are very good, though not all marked. Generally laund at tea at Mrs M's. Have done a little shopping here - here, but not much. Spent evening talking to Brookes.

21. Went to a few churches, had not been in one since 1900 I think. Better than I had remembered them. Mt.

Pleasto, fine work of Rullino, & B. da. Maiano, altar - monument. Then to St. Chiara with Gothic monuments of the Angevins, impressive but fearfully elaborated - look out of place in Italy - St. Aug. a mile, Donatello; Duomo chiefly St. Restituta the old part with int. mosaics in chapel of St. Maria del Principe - early bas relief 8<sup>th</sup> cent., old part in former baptistry - ancient columns (Cor.) prob. from former t. of Apollo. Went in eve. to Sida and heard the best A. I ever encountered, Dra Pacitti who looked, acted and sang the part to perfection.

22. Up early for drive to Ravello, left at 8.30 and went via Castellammare - up a gorgeous mountain road to Mt. Chiungo - over the pass down valley to Maiori. The shore drive had a land slide so there was

no chance of going that way. This was  
a gorgeous experience, wonderful views  
all the way we climbed up & down.  
Got to R. before noon & were glad to reach  
Belvedere where Signora Caresso was most  
hospitable. Parents charmed with it  
all. Coffee on terrace after lunch then  
went thro' garden where you miss the  
roses but where the wall flowers &  
other spring things were. delightful,  
then to P. Buffolo where the dear old  
gardener took us around, then to  
Suomo. They have discovered ancient  
col. inside some of the piles & will  
I hope clear them all off. This is  
the col. near pulpit - where part  
removed sets free more of pulpit.  
Sorry to have to rush over it so.  
Heather perfect for views. Back via  
Vieta-Cava on a most horrid

31  
road, molto cattiva with a vengeance.  
Too bad there is no comfortable way in  
& out of traps to avoid the unpleasant  
part, but we had a wonderful day.  
23. This has to go down as foggy what  
did, mostly odd & end, packing for  
our departure etc.

24. Off for Rome on 2 p.m. train, much  
luggage & full train but we were all  
right. Beautiful trip, splendid mt.  
Reached R. about 7 & were met by Flora  
man. Beautiful suite of rooms on  
top corner overlooking Villa Baghese -  
Young Signorini much to the fore -  
25. ditto & I went to Terme in a.m.  
for an hour. Ground floor, chiefly  
Cyprian & the adjacent rooms with  
collections of Lombardian things (see  
near Guida) showing much coin.  
with Scand. things. In p.m. went

to Trinita del Monte to hear the mass  
 - though the church was cold the music  
 was nice. Walked afterwards along  
 Pincio - back that way through V. 2

26. Spent a.m. in Prehist. Museum  
 much to the disgust of the old  
 custodian who tagged us around, chat-  
 tered at us - called us scionis.

Have since learned that they dislike  
 interruptions to their checker games.

(See note book on collection.) Had tea  
 at Golden Gate - then did a little  
 shopping - went to Liberman's - got  
 della Seta's St. Aust. also a fat  
 new one of Paris which I wonder  
 if I shall ever have courage to  
 read. Evenings we sit around -  
 talk - hear the music.

27. Went to Forum - had a beautiful  
 time - New entrance on Via Canon

old one is closed. Also one ticket to  
 F. Palat. so you can go back - forth -  
 line passed chiefly around end by big  
 basilica, then went to Pal. where  
 others were at Tami's lecture, & we  
 all met later. Laundry on top, things  
 just beginning to come out. Stott's  
 - friend turned up - hot coffee with  
 us after lunch - Shampoo at Ruffi's,  
 tea at Bucci's.

28. L. I went to station to meet Traci -  
 due 9.45, supposedly, but found 10.30  
 was the time - Sat in garden by the  
 Terme as it was too early to go in.  
 Then found train not due till 1.30  
 so went back to hotel to tell others.  
 Got there to station so early that we  
 went to Letour's for gelati - then  
 met her, looking fine in spite  
 of the long trip. Great to have her.

Went to Terme till it closed in p.m. as E. wanted to waste no time - few things were open. Tea at Rosati which we think best in Veneto.

29. E, L & I went to Capit. Museum and had a fine time poking about. In p.m. we all went to the Braghiera gallery & found some lovely things. Three - Archaic statue - Titian are the best. Had tea at cafe on Pincio, lovely view - could hear the band.

30. A second morning in Arch. almost finished us, if not the collection. An enormous amount here, needs to be interpreted & compared with other things. So yet not easily available, have to put many details in notebook. Early lunch & all left about 2.30

by train to Castel Gandolfo, a lovely ride up. Strange to see fruit trees in blossom - endless little bamboo sticks holding the grape vines that are just starting. Had tea overlooking the lake, then went back thro' the town & returned by another line via Grotta Ferrata - Country is looking beautiful & it made a lovely trip. Weather has been very fine, tho' we struck a little shower on the way back.

31. All went to the Terme, tho' L & I spent much time on upper floor. During our visits have gone pretty carefully over rooms of Ant. etc. Had tea at Eng. tea room but it was very full. After wards E, L & I went for a drive, down to Forum & around by Coast arch, Col. etc.

April 1. Easter Sunday. Went to SMM  
for 10 o'clock mass to see Card. Hum-  
belle, looking very old but very digni-  
fied. After the procession went to  
Lateran where the music was  
beautiful but we got rather cold  
& tired standing; stopped at baptistry.  
Went in p.m. to Girardet & met S. Eu-  
genia coming out, she insisted on  
our returning for a while with her.  
So nice to see her. Tea at Bar Esqui-  
lino as of yore. Much taken by  
their table covers which we  
longed to steal. Prayers at SMM  
lovely music - then exhibition  
of relics by a fat & very bold  
red bishop. Dead tired by night.

2. Went to S. Tami's lecture on Crypt  
of St Peter, splendid. Had never  
been down there before - Chief

difficultly was having to hurry over  
some of the very fine relics. Liked  
T. immensely. Went in p.m. to tea  
with Mrs & Miss Woodruff, beautiful  
apartment, Piazza d. M. 15, and found  
them delightful - One or two other  
pleasant people there, Mrs Jackson &  
an Ital. general much taken with E.

3. Up early & started 8.15 for Corneto.  
Car from Ant. Garage, splendid driver  
Roghayeh Umberto is no longer there.

July 3 - Here begins a catching up  
and the intermediate part will have to  
be filled. This is after Crece.

June 24. Reached Brindisi about 7 o  
after various delays with doctor etc. got  
ashore & went to International - left 1230  
for Bari, arr. 2.45 and got carriage to see  
sight, Baed. Saturday posted home & no idea  
of town. Museum closed,

W. am. Mus. Cath., CP, boats, etc., taken,
