Cruce, 1923.

April 21. Woke early to see sun rise over snow mountains (Erymanthus or Kyllene?) on Gulf of Corinth. Lay off canal, but started though about 10, took 20 minutes. Weather beautiful & landed at Piraeus at 2. But Carl came in tanky boat to meet us. No trouble customs. Went up in 2 motors with our luggage in round a family's in Mc Ford. Reached GB at 3.30, it was very full & rooms not vacated so all went up to School for tea. I have a dear little room next Libs, & window looks to Hyatt. Shall be most comfortable. Other girls Gifford Hansen make up the four. Family delighted with the place, out on balcony after tea. Kato arrived full of Egyptian trip, is at the lecture with Rita. Miss Cris very ill with pneumonia. Whole school dines with BHAT, met nearly all of them,

Noe, Davis, Johnson, Thompson (architect)
then went to Salou, had some music
chiefly by Noe (piano) Davis (violin.)

22. Went to GBS - found family on balcony
much pleased with view - weather hot -
unusually muggy. Spent a.m. then to AS
a got partly unpacked, back for tea - up
to Scop. where BSA did the honors.

Chiefly a general tour & were much pleased
to think parents thought it so lovely. Fine
sunset - After dinner hot music adding
Thompson & me to collection, then college
songs till all hours.

23. Left about 8 in the morning for Piraus.
Dad went too but the others stayed behind.
Found boat & many Romans and got off
soon after 9. nice to meet people from
A.S. many of whom I had heard of -
esp. Mrs. Adams, Prince. Beautiful sail to
Aegina, calm sea, very fine. Many with

donkeys to meet us at the landing & they
were much disgusted to have so many
walk. Hot but fine, splendid in the
pine woods, lovely flowers. Beautiful
flowers, in fact they are adorable every-
where. Went up by different path from
what we had done with Dorpfeld. The
temple looked extraordinarily beautiful.
Potted around a good deal, including
propylaea with octagon cols., bath, mosaic
marks at n. end, dump with fragments.
Returned via strait of Salamis after a
fine day. Sleepy in evening, bed fairly early.
24. Parents decided to go a week earlier
so we spent a good part of a.m. in try-
ing to economize money, tickets etc.
Went in p.m. to Scop. where BSA lectured
to Romans on Old Parthenon, splendid
Romans came to a very giddy tea at
School. Dined with Rita & Rita at Engl.

then went in to see family -

25. Went a.m. to Nat. Museum where Carl showed family the Mys. room. Looked over a good deal of it fairly carefully, but need much time there. Back to GBs where we collected B&H - all stayed to lunch. Left about 3 for Marathon in the Cadillac. splendid drive - lovely while here. Returned via Rutherford & had tea at Paul Renaissance on terrace above the tree tops.

26. As it was rather hot we decided to take family to Nat. Mus. so showed them around all the other parts in a very hasty fashion. Sorry to learn Spio has died a couple of months ago. In p.m. had a gorgeous picnic at St. Marguerite where we had been before. Not such a clear day, but it was a gorgeous drive & we had tea at the same spot on the

hillside with a splendid view. If Trot had been there it would have been perfect. B&H invited parents to dinner & we had the whole crowd there & a fine time, lovely dinner & charming decorations. Three little pink girls. Some music later.

27. Went to Am. Ex. for tickets etc. took Father - very slow there but got money etc. In p.m. left & went to see Miss Ceise an endless dusty drive out the Pottsville road. Glad she is doing well. Back to GB very late for tea & took parents to Acap. mrs. which they liked very much. Mr. But, Carl, Thompson & I went to GB for dinner.

28. Grand day for our trip to Conn. Left at 8 & had a magnificient drive - demonstrated them

7 at we could fast board across foldy seats. GOTH went with us & when we arrived we found Marica & John already had done much - fine breeze at house, great view of ruins, delicious lunch. Then went to museum & looked over C. fragments, later to his storerooms full of them. Learned much about Etr., Mpt., Lk etc. Caught a glimpse of the arch. t.c's in museum John son is doing sculptures. Then to excavations where B took us around. Very interesting - had a look at Actis' bunches, but she was in Rth. so we did not see her collection. Started after tea - hot heavenly drive back arriving about 8.

29. Intended to spend in disastrous

day writing letters but had just got going when C. came along so Mr. got packing hard on his things. Also showed me articles written but, hem & drub. to see if it was o.k. Before lunch Mr Holland explained his new plan of Myc. palace & lent us a photo to take - After lunch looked hasty at Tenuation places, then H & I got going in the library on corn. but traces & north, Balkans etc. Tea at 6, Mrs Murray here, very nice. Sat long time around after dinner.

30. Left at 9 & went after family then to Piazza to see them off. Good boat "Gray" just about like "Parrotkey". Began to rain just as we left the ship but it did not amount to much until we got

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a hard shower. Meantime had stopped for a few errands & got a tool for top of my handsome new bureau. Clever after shower - I tried to get some silk for curtains, but ended with dress material at Ergasterion - then to dressmaker (Scutari, 57 5d. ~~Pad~~) recommended by them, started on dress at once. Then to see P's mother, such a nice call & she was delighted to hear about P. 1/2 of us went to dinner at Kephisia B. driving just in time - lovely out there & a fine party.

May 1 This was supposed to be a dreadful holiday, but all went well - our shopping of the day before in prep. for trip was not really necessary. Hardly remember

what did except that C. showed me a lot of his Maced. & Thess. shields which I was very glad to see and to handle. Went for a fitting, then back to Mrs Murray's tea in school - large crowd there, stayed late - lots of people I did not see, but I did see Miss Kaliphakes, Mrs Lazarus, Mrs Kenyon & our old friend Sotzo who is now marshall at the court -

2. Chiefly odds & ends for Canadian trip. Rita could not go, but we got Natalie instead - Finally managed to do some writing, letters & to read a little in library, esp. on Lyceum - Dickens's restorations. Farewell dinner at school to Murray who leave shortly - everyone there, nice time, music etc. Later - up till all hours getting ready -

3. Started soon after 7 in Cadillac car well stocked with supplies. Stopped to get bats then went out - had glorious drive to Corinth - weather splendid and we went zigzagging along. Did not go to Old C. but through the pass - thought of our funny trip in Uncle Jim's train. L & N pointed out side of Ziggonis to us but we did not stop. Passed Myc. about 11:30, straight thro' Argos where we got a fine view of theatre on the fly - over mts. by a magnificent road zigzags back & forth & showing more & more over gulf & islands. Met lots of sheep herds moving flocks. Lunch under pine plane trees beside a brook, grand outlook - start to plain below Achata kampos which I had remembered from railway journeying in 1900. Up again & into E. Arcad. plain, very

much cultivated. Reached Tripolis abt. 2, went through square but did not stop but continued over next mt. and were caught in a downpour but we got down all right and reached N. about 4. They had had hail here & piles of it lay in the streets. Went to SS. hotel & waited in the grocery store while they got ready for us, as the rain had come through roof into several rooms. Finally got ^{15 dr.} two, after viewing the big one for sort of salon. Ours turned out to be all right but the other was terrible - All very primitive. Rain let up some & we went out to order dinner, café at right as you go to square. Fell in with Panagiotis ⁺ from Gloucester, Mass. who took us in tow, bargained with orange man & got us to museum, which did not

have much in it - One Samophron inscription, a couple of heads some small odds & ends (see notebook.) We were not invited to P's house to see a little figurine dug up in the fields (very poor, late torso, After-Cn type) but he was more proud of his villa, photos & wife. Good dinner at cafe, rain let up - Early to bed.

4.: Started at 7 for Bassae, went past theater, then along this asphalt fields, fine view of Karytaena in commanding position. Good bridge, then magnificent drive along ravines - around mt. slopes, fine distant views, snow mts (Ergmanthus) sea very blue - Andritsena very picture-quesne town, big plane trees - Got miles here (woods a lot but cows not help it) - After much delay got

away at 10.30 - went up hill & down Dale through splendid scenery for almost 3 hrs. Then saw the temple very grey on the hill as the sun was temporarily clouded - Magnificent situation, fine view of stone ahead. Lunched on slope at end of temple, then examined it. At S side door, "chapel" limestone oblique recessed cuttings on steps etc. (Note) Think we got some good pictures when sun came out - Museum not open, phyleters out in fields, but there is not much in it - Very fine ride back, partly same route partly different - Andritsena about 5 - Megal. soon after 7 - Another good dinner - Miracle of a fine day all through - 5.: Left at 6 for Lycoreos, having

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sent miles ahead a met them on
side road as bridge was down -
motor could not get through. Went
thru 2 villages, then along a lonely
stream & then across moor land,
much heather, gorse & white heather
as well as local flowers. Took
just under 2 hrs. Fine view of
precinct on shelf of hillside.
Much lower than I had pictured.
Went ^{early} to museum where a
lot of the fragments have been
put together but where we wished
they had a copy of Dickins's
restoration - Naturally I was
greatly interested at seeing it
all - A few votive rings & ins
but mostly the Dam. pieces. Went
to listen & up to all wall &
then spent more time in the

precinct. Saw the orthostats, side
^{at side steps like stairs is}
door, base, etc. No need to update
as I had refreshed my memory on
Aug 1906 or 1907 ~~XII or XV~~. No trouble in
identifying things. Got back to
motor at 12, having meanwhile
been drawn off into a ditch, so
I think no ribs were broken - It
looked threatening though it had
been perfect at 4., so we hurried
along - had a look at heath but
did not stop for lunch as we
had intended. Anyways it was
flooded & I hope our pictures
will show all right. ate our
lunch in car but got caught in a
terrible pour on the mountains -
Rain has been very severe & washed
out endless fields & flooded
them. Intended stopping at T.

but it was too soaking & we only got bungine & then dashed for Sparta. Took a nap on the way - we kept nice & comfortable with the sides up. Very wet all the way - we were almost soaked getting from motor to hotel. Panhellenion ^{5.30} very nice & clean, fine beds, restaurant below. Went for tea at café & then the rain was lighter so we went to museum. Guard was very loath to open it all so late but soon became most cordial. Took two or three as far as we could but there is a great lot of stuff since we had not been able to see side of excav. on river, far too wet. Greatly interested in seeing all the native floras & old friends

from BSA. Exceedingly interesting museum, & lovely little gardens. Clear when we came out - & light very beautiful behind Taygetes which had a lot of snow on the peaks & which we had barely been able to see as we came to the town. Very elaborate dinner compared to what we had had.

6. Wakened at 5.30 by town band parading around - off at 7 for Midea, brilliant morning. Car got to village - then we started up & went first to fortress on top, met and (?) of a strange child who attacked itself to us - led us around by the back way, but - we did not mind the extra hard climb as it showed us the ravine side so well. Magnificent views. Came

down to palace - ch. St Sophia near by
 Then to convent Pantanassa & were
 entertained by nun who gave us best
 coffee we have had. Then took us
 through church. Had got fine views of
 it from below, all the way up the
 hill we were delighted with the place
 itself and the wonderful view as it
 was extremely clear & brilliant. Then
 to Metrop. with its courtyard & museum
 of archit. fragments then Brontochion,
 then St. Theodore, church w. fine door,
 and finally to Periblepton where we
 went in gallery. On the whole I
 thought archit. features & fragments
 of columns, archit. etc. much more
 interesting than frescos. Must con-
 fess that I saw so much about
 what I knew nothing that I
 want to read Miller to get straight.

Left at 1, 2 for Nauplia, very fine all
 the way. Took digression to Tegea
 which I had never seen, fine found.
 of temple (side ramp) - excellent
 museum. Some Scopasian fragments
 casts of others & of the lovely head
 stolen from museum. Fine mus.
 Great drive to Nauplia, there about
 6, went to New Hotel (very good).
 Tried to get guard for mus. but as
 it was holiday fell George it was
 hard to find him till late, so had
 tea in square & went up to the
 Venetian fortress until too dark to
 see. Dinner shed.

7. Met guard 7:30 at mus. New
 wings from Myc. have been re-
 ranged (see notes). Left 8:30 for
 Argive Museum, supposed to be
 inaccessible but we were all right

without a great deal of walking - On way stopped at nice little church with anc. fragments (foundations & slabs) built in - Heraeum with 3 terraces very interesting. Rough top one is difficult to decipher on acc't. of paving of terrace - (Plan to learn later that oldest t. of Hera - so-called Propyl. are obscure in the plan.) Most impressive the way the terraces pile up, & in view from each over lower ones. Cut across to Agro - then Myc. which we reached just before 12, calling at hotel - seeking quiet. Lunch outside Lions' Gate on masses of flowers in what we hoped was a sheltered place - Violent n. winds all day, brilliantly clear. Hasty look at grave & houses near it

Then up to palace which we went over with Holland's plan - aid of guard who had been foreman & who cleared the stones on floor of ante-room & around the hearth. Then went to tombs beginning with hemispherical (kittel) Then Argisthes (from which no much pottery) Then Clytemn. - Later to 2 rock cut tombs on road (fig but none now). Left at 5:15 & after splendid drive arrived c. 7:45 Much pleased with chauffeur & car, no trouble all fine - Had much to tell others at dinner, then talked to B. in library till nearly 12 & took Agrie H. upstairs 8. Too sleepy to read any, but as I woke early I looked over some from about 6. App'd. at hairdresser 9:30 but many delays - wired family

how we were doing, took films to be developed, ordered glasses to replace those lost in ditch, got money (^{70.40} today) food for trip & back to lunch. Odds & ends of washing, mending etc. until tea which I had with B. & stayed till 7. Then fled for library & wrote Workers' Letter. No trace came in while we were at dinner but we all started fairly early - Endless job getting ready, but about 2. 9. up very promptly & were the first ready to leave at 8. Mail in just before we departed, family fine at Flora in old rooms. Went in taxi driven by B. Reached Pier 8.40 & soon on board Zion, fine big boat very comfortable - 20-in party, "f us, Pybus, Trace, Kate, Rita Adams, Pence, 2 Cutlers, Roseborough,

^{80.} Mrs. Erhart, Mrs. Mrs. Hall (legation), Miss Lemire & our splendid host G.D.P. Lib & I have a fine room, everything is ideally arranged. Got away about 7.30 andunched early, reaching Regina before we finished. Had never been there. Went along shore to t. P. A. H. Col. standing, but many foundations & some pret. houses (see notes). Then to Mrs. which was opened after much searching & formality showing chief ruins, lots fint. stuff (notes). Sailed around to Port Arthur & went up to Temple, much shorter than other path. Lovely evening up here & stayed till sunset. Such a full day we were glad to turn in early to nice little berths.

10. Woke up early, off Rhineo outside

moved around other side to Sito
where we are - very lonely here. Went
first to Exc. house where we were rec'd
by M. Replat who first showed plan
+ told how we'd go. Then up by a
road past hippodrome to gym.
(athletic or educational). Nos goes
through a paired door, cut round w.
moulding + paired columns. Then
to stadium above the sea, tribune
I know not, then along abouts to some
houses, one with 4 hewed stone
+ 2 olive presses, good idea p/plan
of houses, grouping of rooms,
cist. of drains etc. Another low
altar in street - frescoed outside
of house, several layers. Shrub
will panel w. large blocks, natn
stone is used, it splits well +
serves for "house walls, lower form".

etc. No use trying here to discuss
building methods which are unusual
due to stone used. Next to Portico of
Ant. long structure, side of precinct
bulls heads on triglyphs + double
ones for capitals. Bases of stat. of
A. ancestors opposite. Long building
with many cross walls (Hall of
Bulls) might be for ship-homed
altar at one end entrance at other.
House of Taxiarhs, view across the 3
temples, Apollo, Poseidon, etc. + treasure
houses around them, base of Tax.
colossus (which R. thinks was elsewhere)
place of bronze palm tree, tomb
of Hyperorean maiden, 2 Artemis
temple + larger structure - here I
am all wrong having put a.m.
+ p.m. together because so sleepy.
After houses near stadium we went

to Sacred L. (R. thinks not), palaestra,
Perist. house with some cols. left.
Had caught glimpse of lion terrace
earlier. Stopped for lunch & went
back at 3 expecting mus. but re-
turned to late quarter & saw house
on hill, then lion terrace & lake. R
thinks it made later, originally
one side of it was part of quay
or old harbor or this side of it
it was absorbed in lake boundary
old terrace of lions // to this & the
wall continued just same length
as small - latter went by Granite
house, huge blocks from earlier
structure. Then around as above
ending with porticus of Philip.
Scattered in place were rows of
agras full rows Sulla & Mith.
at opp. ends of Philip. BATA says

3 times yesterday to Ph. - 2 times today
etc. Must say Delos is pretty full
& we are sorry we did not go to the
top for the view with some of the
others. Back to boat late. all
sleepy again after dinner.

II. Breakfast at 7, boat at 8. Met
R. for many houses in upper
part of town, many fine mosaics
colonades etc. assisted by the
Director I climbed a wall to take
a picture. Theatre next (see notes)
then to top of it - next to sacred
lake by the Inopus - where EdP & CT
intelligently sat above me & did
not climb up & down but saw
the others - Up to temples of the
foreign gods, retaining wall large
stones funny little flat ones in
cracks. Heraeum, primitive one

inside, packed full of pottery set
in by hand carefully - the very good.
Gate with medallion over it of M.D.
of Mithridates. Then up to grotto which
they now call 3rd cent Base of
statue in it (see mss.). Left at 12
for lunch but to our sorrow had
to leave 2.30. Strong wind, (caused
near Larra. Museum escorted by
Pipas the epimeletes who came over
from Mykonos. (See note book) - found
it a very int. museum, Mr Trace
was choice on the pottery - Then
up to T. of For. Gods for a group
picture - later to the top tower
was not very clear for distance -
Stayed an hour or so (ruins of
anc. temples, old houses etc. on
top) - cut out lower houses -
Back at 7, dead tired - Spent

all time after dinner writing this.
B.H. has his knitting handy. Good night.

12. Off Pans. Breakfast 7.15 - ashore soon
after 8. Went to church of St. which now
is full of refugees, so we could not poking
around much - Chief details in note-
book, but was much impressed by
simplicity & dignity of original part
despite late atrocious additions - Very
fine view from roof. Hoped to see mu-
seum, but it is used for refugees
now so B, C & W went to see if it
was fit to visit. They soon said
it was not, but a filthy hole full
of fleas which left many marks
on the unlucky visitors - Went to
anc. town on slight hill to w. where
the tall tower is built mostly of
anc. marble fragments, column
drums, archit. etc. From other (inner)

side shows round building incorporated in it - Before that we saw St- Constantine, above the sea, with a fine door - some good white steps, above eikanaстasis. Not much else to see in town, so went to cool little espi near the boat - all got away before noon & had a lousy sail around to Phylakopi which we reached in middle of p.m. Had kept vivid recollections of the caves, into one of which we went - of the town which is on the rocks that slope down to sea in a long profile or end in a beach covered with black boulders & round sea worn stones many of which have been used to build the town. Place is just the tongue I last remembered, like a lot of ullas. Good circuit wall,

thick, staircase in it - Palace has fine big lintel threshold (he notes) Difficult to distinguish the 3 periods of walls from each other. Lots of potsherds - obsidian - fine old man, 100 yrs. old, former foreman - Much impressed by volcanic char. of island which we had a fine chance to observe in our walk across to Adams - Followed first above the caves, then along gullies, up & down, rocky, dusty - quite late p windmills, fine mill with pots few trees, good buys, then on other side a great scene of the harbor, to which our boat had come. Town folk are all Cretans (refugees of early rev.) who do not intermarry with other Melians. All glad to reach the cafe - get a

little refreshment before going on board. Lovely night, many stars.

13. After one or two early risings we were in less for a hurry - did not get started very early for our walk to the town on top. site of ancient Melos. Very hot going up mostly in gullies between banks as there was no shade. Nearly melted as we went pretty fast. Went to theater, fine, wonderful situation looking across bay to mt. Cornfields above it, little harbor some distance below. Aph. found somewhere near here. All rested under trees then went up to the town & first to museum, which must be part of the school or something. Has 1911 dig here. (v) Carl & I went to my top of town -

got a most extensive view, all the others went up sooner or later. Saw 2 little churches (n.g.) on way up, one on top. Came down to the harbor at a good pace, this time by open road with fine breeze so it was a pleasure. This was Sunday, lots of people around. After lunch the energetic ones went partly by rowboat, partly on foot, to place along the bay. I thought he had spotted an early site, but Maye. was oldest they got - L & I thought it much nicer to stay on board, only 6 of us for tea. Tried to write up notes & began a letter to H. which has gone on by installments. Others back before 7, gorgeous sunset - lovely sail out of harbor.

14. Roused at 5.30 by a barking and voice of w. that we were entering Thera harbor, so climbed on deck and saw splendid view in early morning light - up on deck about 6.30. All off in good time - up the zigzag to Phira. Towns were looking beautiful on the tops, dotted around at points where they glistened in the sun. Went straight to museum which is a very nice one - Many vases, sculpture room with archaic lions in centre, vase rooms, (see it.) Then got our mules - started for our long trip across the island. The capt. thought we could not embark on other side, so that meant going to wear & back. Very bad road, all dust, ashes & humus & rocks but interesting sights of vineyards & magnificent views.

Had a very poor beast that kept trying to jam my feet against the wall. First town was Pyrgos ⁱⁿ where everyone turned out to see the cavalcade, then in about an hour down to Mt St Elias where we had lunch at the monastery, in a plain white room at a long table with a most extensive view from the window. Then began the hard part down to the saddle of Selada, very rough & rocky where we had to walk a long time, unmounted & went up (also rocky) and around shoulder of mesavouno & Evangelismos, a small chapel on one. foundations. Climbed up through the field to Theate having meanwhile acquired a very genuine phylakos - Theate very attractive, then went to Agora st. The general impression of the town is

very good with shutters - many excellently built-walls, chiefly Hellenistic. Houses are small & show no elegance or variety as at Delos, but the place seems fairly large - Some remains of earlier sanctuaries, rock cut. Went out to farther end to see T. of Apollo Karneios and old rock cut misc. Site very fine, views over the water in both directions - On way down had a magnificent view of the country below. Very rough going down part of it through terrifically deep pumice stone, glad to reach the level & jog along. Back to Phira just after 6 - found the others on a delightful terrace looking across beyond the Burnt Islands. Heavenly sail out just around sunset, had most stirring views

all day, splendid fiery glow over - behind Thasos when we were on top. Great island view, Crete, Melos etc. from terrace - All pretty tired but - very happy after the day - 15. Anchored outside the familar lion of St Mark at Candia - In not so much of a hurry as usual. Our day chiefly museum still Mr. P. went to Crosses to photograph. Walk around town very picturesque, old burnt part near docks built up now. Fountain still very fine & mixed population adds to interest - gaiety, shutters like boozars. Met at Museum at 10 & Mr Xanthoudides at once devoted himself to us & told about his EM finds & then CTS in the new museum fine, putting on 1st floor up. New guide (Gk)

sure to be very useful. Got no more than a general impression of many old friends as we went fairly carefully through the earlier periods from Messara tools & Mohlos - Basili like & had the cases open so we could take things out. Afterwards all lunched at the Crosses under guidance of John & returned to boat for siesta. Found it too comfortable to get away very early but returned for another siesta in museum (see notes), had coffee at place near park & museum then spent long time arranging about camion for ♀. Back to boat for dinner - all had a nice last evening together. Cruise has been a huge success - we hate to have it over and to part with the good old Zion.

16. Went ashore about 9 after having said good bye to those who were off for Phaistos. After some delay secured rooms at the Galia, typical hotel. Got several cars to take us to Crosses, leaving about 1030 or 11. Very different from the old way of getting there. Lovely drive out. When we arrived Sir Arthur was directing a group who were making trial excav. some distance N. of palace. General appearance of place much changed with restorations & rections like the observation tower. (A) Had a cordial welcome & were taken around by himself, showing MM houses recently found N. of or. court, then to N. area, Beater, N. entrance, diff. reconstructions etc. N. court now regarded as state entrance, house? in room formerly called Peter's Lodge. Other more

room almost unrecognizable with timbered ceiling, gay columns before bustal area, reproducer frescoes etc. Big staircase near it, large rooms with landings etc. - prob. com. w. large rooms on upper level. Great to visit E. quar. which I had known only from books. Great help to get idea of diff. levels by going through them. Adjourned to lunch in pine grove behind Villa Ariadne, lovely huge tree. Gardens of villa fine - On way had glimpse of Little Palace of which much is buried beneath olive grove. After lunch went back by ourselves to N. area & royal villa & when back in court after took us to room with charnel which will supplement royal villa, has deeper charnel. Saw south side & south house

about which I know very little. They are tracing a paved road which led S. so I went off to look after that when poking around when Mr. Toni came with new plan & explained his reconstruction of w. quarters, questioned by B.H., W. Then poked around a bit by ourselves, E. quar. again & ended in w. court before we saw E. again to bid farewell. Some criticize the amount of rebuilding done, also say things have been very freely or individually interpreted. Back about 7 and secured small double on top floor - Have most of our meals at the Crossens.

17. Breakfast with the "kids" before making a presumably 7 o'clock start for Phaestos. Had a wonderful blue camion reminiscent

of the "horse box" but it held us all - turned very comfortable, wooden roof great protection from sun & overhanging branches. Splendid view across the island, earlier part was olive (grapes very fine) and vines, later wheat or oats took place of vines - very fertile. Magnificent views, snow on Ida.

Fine long zigzags up to one top of mt. ridge, stunning country, big ravines, no large bare patches. Met the other car on stopped above a deep valley filled with people who were there for festival and made a gorgeous blaze of color with their bright costumes, & the blankets on their backs. Before that, the chief village we went through was H. Vanaria where we stopped at the spring.

A crop. of Prinias is on hill to w, a fine plateau. From top of mts. here follows a series of magnificent views of Messina plain through which we ran to H. Deta. Could see the water from above, also fine view of group of hills on which d. is situated. Went to house of Manoli and had coffee prepared by John who had stayed over to meet us. This is the famous little house in which all the celebrities have stayed. Strolled over for a quick look at the museum, in which the thing that most interested me was a statue of a woman with drapery like Despina's, at least it hung in folds from her b. arm & had animals & flowers & fringe on its. Not much of a work of art, but interesting.

Started off for φ, first passing what is left of Gortyna near church of St. Titus (see later) then by a gradually worse road until at last we had to turn through the fields, back to the road - through an arch & stopped not far this side of Βοι, to which they sent for donkeys - we sat under an olive tree & waited, then had a fairly steep but short ride up to φ. whose situation is recognized far & wide by guard's house above. Magnificent day there. Many think it far finer than Creos. & there is far more spaciousness of outlook & lack of additions in plan. I believe E & Mac are very anxious to dig & see whether there is anything in lower levels beneath. At present it is not so difficult

to disintangle as there are few, only 2 periods rep. (A) much impressed by numbers of staircases, as well as by magnificent state rooms, by fine white gypsum, plentifully used in blocks & slabs, far more than is apparent at C. & much better quality. Found Firmin's plan very useful though needed slight addition. Got what might be some very good pictures. Lunched under trees close by Palace, fine prospect from there. Afterwards went carefully through whole Βοι, accompanied by Σ. Σ. Much pleased to see how familiar I found both C & P. Stayed till after 4 & then started for Η. Τriada, going to the left around the next hill. lovely flowers, particularly a pink one

something like clover which made the hillsides look as if they were covered with heather. Very fine views in all directions. It is in a beautiful situation overlooking the sea. Difficult to work without any plan, nearest approach to it is in Quide Joanne. (1) Particularly fine for stone drains, staircases, several rooms with benches & fridges below. Indication of various levels but in limited time did not try to make out too much. On way down visited two tholos tombs, one with adjacent structures. Both tombs preserved only part way up, sloping floor, rock surface. Both 24(II, -III). Fine but short ride to river which we forded in a very amusing fashion. Bed of

river full of beautiful pink wild carnations, view at junction of 2 streams particularly fine. Then thro' olive groves back to camion. Nearly 7:30 when we left - but managed to get through the rough field road before dark. Rather weary & hungry when we arrived but had had a glorious day. Bed - I had a room in a loft in top floor of house of the demarch. Big room in it had some very handsome hand woven things on bed, but it was very hard. 18. Rather an amusing time getting up but finally reach Mandri's for breakfast. Then took camion to St. Tibes which is in ruins of Guryna. Huge church, only apse & adjacent parts left, much interesting construction, stone vaults, curved & lintel

to side chapels, keystone wedge, one red window left in apse, in n. chapel roof has long wedge shaped course adapting to diff. of p. The chapel ext. of apse etc. angular & not round. Must have been a fine church, some nice carved details left (part of screen etc.). Then to Rom. Theatre, small & rather nice, with Code on wall behind it, now covered over for protection. Looked less archaic than I expected. Then a great hunt on other side road for t. of Apollo, which when finally dis-covered was propped up to a level of 3 or 4 feet. BHT says all Rom. though used blocks were red. Saw also remains of Roman bath etc. Then got to canyon & went up across the range. Stopped in the

shade just after passing the crest and lunched there. Started again abt. 3 o'clock & discussed whether we should go from Huarara to Aerop. of Prinias which is on a fine high plateau not far away. Decided as boats were so uncertain we'd better make sure of museum, so got to C. abt 4.30 and after cleaning up had an hour or more there. After coffee went shopping & got a nice ³⁰⁰ Cuban waistcoat, single-breasted, & a ⁷⁵ cap. Dinner on street across from Cus.

19. Spent most of the day in museum, got there soon after 9 & with CTS went carefully through things in outer room. X again very nice about opening cases - to chance of a boat - for several days which is a pity, for though it is cool - the mus.

20. Celebrated Sunday by having later breakfast, but sat up in bed from about 6.30 looking over pictures &c in P.M. Sir Arthur came to museum - talked at least an hour & a half on things from Cusco. Particularly valuable on his ideas above connections, relationships etc. (1) Hope to do certain of these over carefully & also to sort out sites, as there will be no boat yet. Invited E to lunch but he could not come, wise man. Went p.m. to Tylissos, s.w. Caudia up towards hills - Very interesting site, 3 hours (1) in fine situation. Spent a good time trying to disentangle places and settle disputed points as to where walls & entrances went. Fine drive going and coming in the blue camion. L & I had walk on wall in eve.

21. Started about 6 a.m. to make up notes. Spent whole a.m. in Mus. working chiefly in A, B, F rooms, after a visit to the workroom first - where we saw the restoration of large piñon & smaller things going on. Interesting to see how they did it. Very full notes. In p.m. left at $\frac{12}{3}$ ³⁰ to go to Tucson Ranch in the camion. Stopped at a bridge about 10 A.M. out - and had picnic lunch, then some went swimming. Lovely spot fine ravine full of reanders. Then on to N. M. where we went carefully though it with help of plan which Tawny kindly lent us. Then drove to Cusco & arrived at 6 just as the workmen were leaving. Had dug a lat more in n. place. Spent a fine hour pottering about on our own, next then' n. to S. & carefully dug, then [see skipped page]

19 cont. fine the hotel leaves much to be desired & the food gets fearfully monotonous. Tried to catch up diary during siesta time. Got to museum again about 3 & stayed till 6, spent most of it in S. wing, 3 rooms. Very interesting Primas sculptures. Room 1 has NB's old Ravousi finds & a lot of others we saw in 1901. In room 1 pleased to see that lovely stele of youth with quiver. S.C. Lov started to drive to Cus. to see if Mac would come to museum Sunday & as we were at a little café on the way out he came by on a donkey & said Mac would come tomorrow. As there was no room to continue to C. we took shore road & had a lovely drive past Taton Oros as far as Morón Chani which Tawny

had excavated & told us about in the museum in the morning. It is a LMI house with about 40 rooms (1) and very interesting to visit. Little use of good masonry except for gypsum blocks for door bases, other walls rather poor stones in reddish clay (like my red wall), lovely drive back just after sunset with beautiful rays glow. Evenings are not much to relate, as we sit talking around the table & hasn't light enough for other things. 20 (cont.) to domestic quarter and as we were puzzled about a place in Double Axos I went back to camion for P.M. & when I got back found E was taking crowd to Villa Ad. to see the house bowls he found the day before. Very interesting to see the house as well, work room, draughting room, living room

roof terrace etc. He showed us the plans of palace with periods in diff. colors, colored up over (to be plate) of Chiffrain, lily etc. Note next vol. will soon be out. We drove back after dinner up to Plataea & went to High Life to stock up with food for journey.

22. Up at 6 to pack, then made a hasty copy of Mr. X. and got to bus. by 9 where we stayed till 11. Spent most time in big room - waited to leave museum but glad to start for No. after an affectionate farewell to Tawny who has been most awfully good to us. Left just before 12 for s.s. "Byzantium" which is less bad than most ex. boats. At least it promises to be. Many volunteers but they finally cleaned the decks.

Fine sail along north coast, calling at Rethymna but did not think it worth while to go ashore. Luckily have some steamer chairs. All 6 of us are camp in the gynakion which is really meant for 8.

23. No need to fill this with a description of the cheerful night, which some of them spent on deck. Luckily I escaped thanks to Keating & naphth. Were at Canea where we got up, having arrived about midnight - & started drags going again about 5. All ashore after breakfast, searching for the Museum which we found after a long hot walk, for it must be nearly a mile from the quay, outside the town. Great delay, but cool & pleasant spot to wait. Mrs. Small - unimportant but had the sun. Went in camion to Suda Bay

where most had a swim. Magnificent harbor, lovely country, very fertile, low hills, snow mts. Thought Canina would expire before we got back, but we did it. Coffee & Shirts, new boat & fine sail for p.m. mostly writing letters or reading books about Crete.

24. Heavy betting as to when we should reach Piraeus - whether Rita could catch her boat - with the other Romans. Fine sail past Agia, May at quarantine but we were ok on vaccination. Saw "Mycali" in harbor & wait much scramble R & I were transferred to it, though I went to A.B. for luggage - we presume she got boat as we've not seen her since Attan met us - we had coffee while the luggage came - Recher School about 11.30 & never saw a more

clean or comfortable place after the sordidness of the past week. Took most of p.m. & endless hot water to get even partially clean, wet all our things on the roof. Lots of mail, all fine. Lift films to be developed after tea. Spent much time going over others' pictures & marking what we wanted.

25. All went across the street at 10 for the ceremony of starting the Gennadion. Had 5 monks and a service, fine abbots with full regalia, holy water, flowers etc. & then the slaying of the cock on the first stone laid with all the workmen around, new refreshments in the shelter. Rest of a.m. in library, chiefly looking at Mista book. After lunch went over plans of Gennad. with Batt, CB, L - Thompson, & again in evening to place light, bells etc. Shampoo & Shoe Lane.

26. Am. in museum, vases, pre-Hys.
room & basement to see sheets from
Hymettus dig (chiefly geom.) Most
of my time in room w. Phylak, Then
etc. - then AgBw came in & I found
where they thought various carved
stone bits from Hys. came from.
All home in Ford after a few
errands. We lunch as well as dinner
with B. these days. Long session in
library selecting photos. Read report
on Tylissos in 'Eg.' 2. Dinner by B in
honor of Mac & Thompson, ^{skeletochae} music after-
wards. Had tea with B. in Salmaki.

27. Long surge writing letters with many
interruptions because I hadn't time to
go upstairs for them. Talk of cult for St &
a long one to M. Tea in comm. room as a
farewell party to N + T, who come here,
also Akw. Took photos on roof. Long

Talk with B in eve, & hear some music.
28. Started on Ph. - JTT in Mont Art. to try to
catch up, then in C's study. My photos came
before luncheon & it took much of the pm
to go over & identify L's & mine, & order
etc. Went to tea at Mrs. Erhart's, very nice
apartment, spacious sq, which we got to
by going unnecessarily high on elevator.
Some pleasant people here. Drove in Ford
to near Phil. and beyond, beautiful road
along the shore. Place rather reminis-
cent of Coey Island - much weird
architecture, but beautiful situation -
Glorious sunset. Nearly everyone did
photos in eve - I put a lot of my films
into little book but it is a long job
& I stopped to play with PMA.
29. Weather is pretty hot - so most time
goes in library which is comfortable -
trying to read up on things seen

on trip, especially in journals we do not have like Montet, Cicali, etc. Mr Soutzo came to tea so BHTH asked us, - then again came in with Bishop Gore. Afterwards BHTH, I & J went again to Phallion while C. played tennis. Had coffee at a delightful spot on the shore.

30. Even after about 3 days this is a forget what did, because each day is more or less the same sort of reading. Letters in p.m. but will never get caught up. B told us about five letters from Man. Com. - what appropriations had been made for excavating, on a small scale.

31. Most of the day went in getting photos straightened out, arranging films, going over other people's pictures. Went to tea at Bish. School.

Woodward, Russell - one or two others - run me bishop. After tea had a wonderful time looking at the plans & rest. of Mys mostly de Yong's, except for H's palace he has shown us. At gram O & houses adjacent, plan & sketch, rest. of megaron, staircase plans & sections, & a lot of the beehives. Then a great many perfectly beautiful colored sketches of the pottery, jewels & small objects, lots - lots of them, beauties. The U. L. World News Feb 24 had two full pages of ill. in color, came too late for me to have seen it. Glad of reference - W. says there is a later one with more. Saw lithographs by Mrs Gommie, mostly very post-Rish & modern, but a nice one of Mys. from me with post-Rish, a good one of gram O with all 6 tombs. Could write indefinitely about the

water color pictures, hopeless to expect them to reproduce the lot, which is a great pity for they are splendid. Strange there is not a better appreciation of the value of this monthly in Com. - that they do not get it all out in a fine volume. Stayed another hour, almost till dinner time.

June 1. Ran across a lot of good stuff in Aegeanica including Tylissos plans in Vol. III. B bought part of the excav. money might be used for graves near Tari so we got out the maps and dug through some German commentary as we thought of going down there in p.m. Decided it was too hot. About 6 like & I went for a few errands; got my dress from dyer & it looks very nice, then to dressmaker for her slacks; nice

out of doors by that time. In eve was much interested in the bibl. C. showed me, the famous one the students had been set at by E.C. Also went through last Vol. of Maraghianis & looked at an article on Prinias in Annual of Stat. School in Athens, vol. I. Afterwards played a little with D.

2. Thought a good summary would be the best way to clinch trip so started through PM in a sketchy way, mostly for illustrations. Also read reprint of 2 admirable articles by W. which are to appear in Camb. Archaeist. (1) Early Reg. Cir. (Cute, Cyc, Hell, Then) (2) Prehistoric Greece (chion.). Went over some BSA on Cross. & E. Cute after lunch - began making curtains for bedroom - tea in Salomaki, C.L.S. as B had to be polite to guests above. Grand reunion dinner for Mr Pratt, on roof, a

great success, w-there. Fixed a long table, lamy flowers - lights & a very superior dinner. Stayed out until all hours afterwards.

3. No hurry about getting started on Sunday. Made up diary, wrote to M. but we decided to go on a picnic sea so proceeded to get ready soon after lunch. Finally started & went away past St. Mercurio & down the mountain & across nearly as far as Oropos where we picked a fine place with extensive view and spread our mgs, thermos & H.P. tin boxes out. Beautiful day though warm, lovely country, lots of pine woods & a beautiful drive back when we began a most career of arriving very late for dinner.

4. Tried to straighten out correspondence,

wrote a lot of cards etc., sorted photos, gathered up odds & ends on deck. Rains on hot sun. Tea in Sal & then drove to Phil. [This was June 5] & saw a fine sunset. In eve Mr. Holland went over a lot of material on Greek & had some very int. restorations as well as telling of a lot of very early Hellen. things in - b.r. of building.

5. Considered going to mrs. but did not get at it in time so sat in library instead & wrote a hurried letter to Tint after lunch & before we started on scouting expedition to look up possible grants to excavate near Vani. Fine drive down towards the sea. Then we got on a road through the woods close to the water & past Red & hospital, lovely country. At little St. Nicholas chapel we went mistakenly to right & got into rough going but stopped at a

lovely spot on Cape Kavri overlooking a bay - across to Cape Zoster, right in the pines with a splendid breeze. Route must have reached coast near C. Kosmas, anyway it later passed Haliki, with its salt marshes pretty much dried up. After tea cut across - got on the road to Tonliagmeni which we had in mind to take. Fascinating spot, grand views, rocky shore inland from which are the clear salt pools (one good sized with bathing houses) deep & green with sheer cliffs rising beyond - the whole basin-like place full of nice green bushes. Got a lot of sea lavender on the shore. Did not go over to Kari village or the case but made for a group of ruins called Palaeochori, many anc. blocks (4 or 3^d) few in much of an arrangement, but it

was probably part of the deme Naxos - there are various blocks on other side modern road too, but no visible graves. Too late to try to see the other groups mentioned in Karter von Attika, but when we reached the road we found flat tire, then leaking valve - other horrors so we spent a night - sat - sat - at last got back to dinner about 10.

6. Museum in a.m. Spent all my time going very gradually over cases of small things in Mus. room 64-76 as I wanted to compare them with Cretan - with each other. After lunch went over Tektumtas on Thersaly & Fort. Regime - after tea drove to Phallou where the clouds were black over Pelop. - promised cooler weather - In eve. had another session with L.B.H. who re-claimed particularly his restoration of

parts at w. end.

7. Museum Myc room again 77-82
when Mr. Trace came along & we all went
first to workroom off & there various
things are & saw them restoring a very
fine medallion ^{dark grey} pi^{thos}, the only one in
stone so far, much like those at Cr.
They are rearranging the S.E. cor. of R. 8
put up several frags. from Myc. mostly
belonging apparently to early dn. temple,
prob. parts of metopes. Seated woman,
bull - lion, legs - arms etc. mostly
very fragmentary but will make a good
study. I am cast of one Acc. Maiden
on a base found near Marathon, she
does not belong there, but a similar
statue does - they have its feet - the
pinkish that fits - hole of base. Then went
to 27 (W. think) where Gil. works, & saw
a lot of the things Mr. had shown

us the water colors of, lovely little
blue beads, gold granulated bead with
paste inlays etc. Amber which can now be
heated so as not to crumble, so can
ivory, lovely necklaces with pendants, gem
with genii, mirrors to fit - ivory handle from
Clyt. Afterwards I chased lilies with
W. & later went to hunt thro' Park ^{to} Ká
pr Tzountas's reports. Did this after
lunch till tea time which we had in Sat.
west C. Later took the Ford & got Bert &
did a few errands, cabled LMS, then drove
to Piraeus & all around all parts of
the peninsula, splendid road above
the sea - very near line of ancient walls
(mostly 4th cent. B.C.). Fine view of the
fort in Phaliron bay. Rather late when
we finished dinner, then did some
park until B came along & got talking.
8. Museum, 83-92 + 42-53. After lunch

wrote long letter to M. had tea early - then went to Aerops. starting with the usual 4 + Kat + Holland + Elderkin, so we picked up another one. Had a long interesting session on Evans. beginning in Pandoreion with the corner near r. door, proceeding southward & under porch of maidens, suggestions about terrace & its building on it. Much discussion of state of finish of blocks & r., whether earth would leave marks etc. B thought its building would be disprop. high. Then inside following traces of Myc. or pre-Myc. stones, st. of which had already been seen under Pand, stair to Maid. These were in r. part of under cellas (not s. or n.), also one near r. wall of r. cella. Discussion of aedicula, what like, its position etc.; p. well

- Trident marks - no discussion yet of rest. of r. end with shelf & cols, but they seem acceptable to most of us. Then outside to 4's new dig in L & gr porch where there is a good long line of wall that turns before r. porch is reached - Good stratif. Sheds in these walls an A.H. which makes a long interval if Myc. is skipped. Third no doubt pris. Er. continues something very red, prob. a poor structure - before last Myc. - then something earlier. Stayed till it was so dark we could not see - while we were at dinner W came in, had a letter from Evans telling that in the NW house they had found many ^{near} frag. & pieces, one has man with head horns & black agami, chased by some one with a "coal black leg". AUBW suggests calling it "the House of the

One-legged Negro." Gil. is there working on the fescals. Senegalese troops. On acct. of recharge E. is letting up on some work & went Mac & de Jong is crossing the island looking for conn. southwest, I suppose that is where his new road (wedge basins) leads. Told W. what I had got from Park. & we went over a lot more, so he has pretty well identified all the Tholoi Ts. mentions & seen just about everything built up to time of his own dig. So briefly writing up Gram Cicle now, part III of his report, which is I Gate II Gram. III Ramp II R/House I House Warrior VII House VII GO, VIII Stela (done by Hartley). q. Thus. all time open - going very slowly over Shaft Graves, putting them in his chosen order VI, V, IV, III, II, I. Very cavalier treatment of things ^{Stat's} regards

as comparatively unimportant. Very noticeable dearth of pottery in shaft gr. Mr. Ware came over after lunch with his report, explained some things about it - left it until Monday. Read IV, then did a few domestic things like pressing as it was cool. Actually got certain done. Decided L & C would like to go over W's report, so we moved to Com-Room & I read part of it aloud & we noted any things that needed cleaning up.

10. Slept till about 11 and got a grand rest as we had been up pretty late nights & I had got a sort of chill that went to my slats. Slept it off. Most of the day we went over W's report - though we stopped to write letters after lunch. C went over and bagged a lot of plants - watercolors. Horrid cold day with downpour in afternoon.

got through as far as Grav O.
 11. Decided not to try museum but
 to go ahead with report, so I read the
 rest, perfectly splendid, & then made
 a few notes & went over plans again
 carefully - decided must try to go to
 M. again - Found Rome - P. express goes
 every day, so have decided to remain
 here until 22nd and then beat it for
 dear life - After lunch had a look at
 part of Schol. Myc. when W came along
 & then he ran along the whole of Grav
 Circle section which summarised his
 of myc. which lasted till tea time -
 After tea it was rather nice out &
 directed by the director we went to
 Phaleron & saw a beautiful sunset.
 While we were at dinner W. came to
 bring Glasgow's The Minotaur which
 we had been speaking about at tea,

- we arranged about meeting at Myc.
 later in the week.

12. In a.m. read report of BST last report
 on Myc & road Glasgow about to L. Left
 about 4 to finish our abandoned expedi-
 tion of last week. Took rare road to
 where we cut across country to St Nicholas,
 small chapel with a few ancient blocks
 in & near it - No archit. value - Had tea
 under a tree near by much to interest
 & peasants gathering stones in fields.
 Country lovely, lots of wild thyme in
 blossom, purple like heather & very
 fragrant. Particularly beautiful day
 after rainy weather - got much luck
 about finding graves but we saw no
 end of remains of ancient villages
 done - had a nice time
 clambering around, lonely drive back
 by sea, with rose colored sunset.

Sat long around dinner table, much gossip about when & where certain things were found. Seems no excuse to doubt Boston gold bowl, whatever may be said & wise on it. Some know that ivory snake goddess came from, Boston. Stone was found in his garden & hidden for years in Eng. before going to USA, slipped out during excitement over L. stone. Mystery of hear in Met. store room. Someone could write an amazing yarn of these.

13. Off to Mus. & put in a fine morning, all of it on finishing the other parts in Mus. room (not in Cat.). Letters & odds - ends until early tea, then errands in preparation for tomorrow's trip. Cabled date to family. Didn't manage to get to reading I had selected in eve.

14. Up about 7, packed very lightly, left about 9 in Cadillac, beautiful day & a lovely drive. Stopped beyond Lake St. in a charming wooded spot above a sandy beach for a light lunch about 11. Very gorgous pink flowers along river beds, finer than we had seen in Crete, particularly when we reached Argive plain & followed river which was a solid mass of them - the loveliest things imaginable. Went whistling through County - but old timer on side road met Leslie Cracker migrating for the season. Lunch under pine trees in fine spot of J. pass. Reached Myc. about 3 or 4 m^s W, left luggage at Beautiful Helen, acquired under Geo - started right up the hill. First stop - Mt. (A) then got a few shrubs in tobacco field on my back to root; next stop Clytie (A) thorough poking around - then up to

Theatre seats, much tall - Beg. (11) next very important addition to facade. Then lions, Granary, stratified area beside int. gate; grave O with long discussions & poking about. Gradually worked up by hours, H. houses, ramp & up to palace where we parked about till it was too dark to see a thing, so I have a hazy recollection of the top part where Dr. temple was - also about the Shrine, Room Pithai & upper corridors but think I can work it out from his plan in addition to notes & assistance of others who went. Scrambled down in dark, dined about 9. Glad to stay in famous house of which I had heard so much, all very neat & comfortable.

12. Woke early & managed to haul myself into sitting up in bed -

writing down all I could of what we had seen - Still at it when it was time to dress. Started for upper regions about 6.30 and did tombs all the morning. Sorry I have not been around the circuit walls as I wanted to, but was very glad to go over beyond the ridge on unfamiliar territory. Have very full notes on the morning where we first did the remaining 6 Dolos beginning with lion. Took many pictures which ought to be fairly decent. Next did Taltani cemetery (11) going into a great many a quarry types of 14 II - III - IV, Br & I saw a tremendous lot - It was a trick to do it so carefully. None of this is publ. yet but will go into the Report. We walk around back of hill to house. Off across plain & got to it in time for a rather late lunch at

New Hotel, had room with balcony, very comfortable. Then went to museum and was a treat to go over it with W (H). Left about 5 for Kainé to see what the Swedes had done there. Turns off from Epid. road across country - out by poor road to fine promontory between 2 bays, more decided than it looks on map. Sat on slope of hill for tea and had fine view across to Tolon - little island Rhodi close by it. Much amusement over use of flagstaffs. Had shower before tea, but no harm. Very nice place strong natural position, Hellenistic walls, acrop. a good mixture of hel. (E&H) and Hell. (H). Went around & side & up by N & then all around top & down by steep track above water on w. side. All this is very nearly done - not complete

yet. By special arrangement Swedes can take finds home for 3 years to study & publish so there is nothing to be seen except innumerable pot. sherds. Tomb in hill to r. of road just before reaching sea but we did not go to it as W. says the doorway has fallen in. Entrance at side of chamber, not a regular ^{per.} holes. Site evidently used very early & probably levelled off at top as Hell. strata is almost above E&H & some Hell are left farther down on slope. Destroyed about 700 but used again presumably late 4th or 3rd. Had nice walk above sea on way toward Tolon, but hot sun came to meet us at nearest point so did not go to T. as it was so late anyhow & we got a good idea of it from across bay. As usual, back late but we had seen

a lot - as another busy day was ahead we went up fairly soon after dinner.

16. Roused by B. banging on wall at 7, breakfast 7.30 but delayed a little in getting up. Sorry to say goodbye to W but hope to see him about Dec. 1. We stopped at Tivijen as I was much out of date on it, - C. explained the results of Kurt Müller's recent study of the walls assigning them to 3 periods (see W's Myc. Report) & working out the plan of the palace as it apparently was originally, with so-called tower's Myc., & later with Myc. - further w. None of this is in print yet but can be worked out on plan. Saw foundations of 0 building on upper cit. (purpose unknown yet) & apsidal wh. is on middle cit.

Some of this is in Timmen also see notes. Decided to stop at Nemea where I had never been. Bad road very rutty. Fine view of temple, 3 cols, from above cross field to get to it, many children including two from Manchester & the very proud of English. Temple long & simple in plan, int. cols. on raised floor & around to back. Good chance to study construction, orthost. etc. etc. B. Stopped on way up at spring to fill bottles. Zygouris stood up so temptingly we could not resist it in spite of threatening shower, so went across the fields skipping, first at the 2 tanks on opp. slope. Same gen. type as at Myc. On citadel lots of 0 and Myc. Great job to disentangle them - not always easy to note structures apart from pottery etc. I am sure I

never could learn to do it. Certain
rather tidy spot about the cobble
wall structure. (1) Scuttled across the
fields when rain started - managed
to escape wetting - by time we got
to Cornish the rain was well over
- the p.m. fine. Had picnic lunch
in Exec. house, looking the cupboards
as well as taking our own food -
B got out the big plan (this morn)
& smaller red & black (Wood) & went
over some points, also saw various
notebooks of all these years. It
will be a great job for the person
who writes the general account -
B showed me the parts across the road
which I had not seen, Rom. basilica
& lots of the colonnade foundations,
B base for big column - NB very
fine work of terrace wall to E, al.

most brick, certainly earliest - best R.
work at C. Went afterwards to other
side via top of Peirine & got to Old Spring
where we had a great talk about it - I
heard detective work at first hand on
reservoir, lions, water supply, sewer
passage, faked matches, abattoir inc.
ravines levels, Lysip. base, Bell & Pegl? -
Hasty glance at this in which new
concrete floor has just been put - Got
to Rorakou 6.45 - much to Dr. Mys. dis-
gust stopped to scramble up for about
1/2 hr. as he fears being in place would
close. The sums less well constructed
than 2. but maybe I am wrong - The
stones are not so hard or well shaped
- the clay seems to wash one - more -
C. quite disgusted about the weather
Saw famous spot - where the stratif.
was so significant. Could write a

lot, but will use book instead - Co. station closed, but got bread, had picnic dinner by station over canal, fine drive back in dark, arr. 11:30 dinner 12.
17. Breakfast rather late, a.m. washing pot sherd, cleaning out table drawers etc. After lunch wrote H. took sherd to Com. Room & went once a lot with C. wrote up diary & some notes, wrote Conder & Horne before dinner - Hunted up Nemea, Asine etc.
18. Am. to Amherst & cashed factors' cheque left films, then mus. Finished temporary in Myc. room & went to archaic for rest of a.m. After lunch did Eq.'s on Tholoi & went thru Mitt. refs. to Tiryns & began To. on Myc. Pot in D'part. '86. After tea had archaic lesson in Stra of Athos. Eve on pre-Myc. pottery, sherd ex. Tavakou & Karo's Tiryns. Went over T. plan with C.
19. Left in Ford about 9 via Eleusis &

Eleusis for Thebes - Splendid drive, occasional raindrops. Thebes flat - dull but museum very fine (1) especially the early things upstairs - Psh. & also AIN's Halae & the Rhizoma finds - Little left of house of Cadmus but we visited it. Went by the plain across country on terrible road to Scamandre & had good look at museum, back to where we joined road from Drosos - over mt. by St. Mere - Taivo - Great day - Home about 9:30.
20. Up early doing odds & ends. Went down to about tickets, long job with exchange - Many errands Egasterion, wrapping paper, bookstore etc. After lunch started getting ready to pack, tied up many books to post. Went at 5-6 home Shampoo, Ben P's mother - Eve washed potsheards, bridge later with Soc.
