Lichtenberg draws att. to distinct types
 based on pol. + agr. in Europe + those
 based on sea power, Amer. agr. Asia.

Plantag. empire of Eng + Brit-E.

Incompat. of these 2 types cannot go
 together, cannot be both. Might have
 taken Sp. if 16, 1718 as example -

Extent, variety, combini of incompatib.
 Then Europ. poss. were limited by +
 overseas dom. took on temporary new
 lease of life. The med. Span. emp.
 was on cont. almost - radius of order
 Europ., Mediit. type. Conquered almost
 entirely from Aragon, Valencia etc. in N.E.
 realms. It had attained their other
 limits by mid 11th C. Castile cont.
 to last down to Granada till 1492.
 More than a coincidence that

i. Castilian share is small in Med Emp. Acquires Canary Isl. accidentally, Norman adventurer & pirate mixed in, known at least p.t. of Castile.

(1) Conq. of Balear. Isl. from Saracens 1229-1235 - hardly empire. From Clas. times had been regarded as part of Sp., could block Barcelona trade. HRE w. donet for Fr II ended in favor of Pape. Aragon dyn. related to Johnstaufen, daug. of Manfred married; lady Constance in Arag. took over govt. of Coradino - King of Sp. had to postpone adventure, then to Tunis under queen 1282

(2) Then crossed to Sicily - overran it in a month, rising vs. Angioin masters. Sic resp. not instigated by Aragon. Harder to hold than to conquer, so yrs struggle of arms diplomacy & eccl. Younger son of Pedro & Cr. got - no island, not actually incap. in Spain but subord. dynasty until 1409.

(3) Sardinia comes in incidentally w. Sicil. conquest - Papacy grants Cors & Sard. to Aragon under suz. of city of Rome - Overlordship shadowy, Pisans & Genoese had occupied it - Aragon asked by Pap. to conquer it. Doubtless struggle for 100 years. Aragon & Genoese trade rivalry, esp. in Sardinia.

Econ & const. Not merely arms, fleets annexed. Gt trade, Barcelona next after Genoa, ships every where incl. Sicily, relat. to N. African states. Fighting w. Moor over after Conq. of Bal. Those relat betw. X^t Barcel & Af. Moors, Consul who looks after X^t is a Moor & vice versa in Barcelona.

Moors have X^t. mercenaries in their armies, not renegades. G^t of Aragon sanctions his hon. employment. G^t. prestige of Barcel. early code of maritime law (13th cent). In 14th Barcel. code enforced the whole Med. law. to all lands, no indicat. of where from or under whose authority. Really international.

This task too big for any man, any one wd. be more than enough. Helped. vs Turk, Reform, France in Italy, intern. disturbances in Spain - Under strain Ch. phys & mental strength broke down. One vice:

gigantic eater. Death of Ferdinand made him practically R. in Spain, son for Joanna & Charles. Duke Adrian & Utrecht made regent in Sp. An alien, good & gentle, Card. Ximenes remained till his death just after Ch. arrived in Sp. Almost complete stranger but bro. Ferd. almost entirely a Span.

Ch. made mistake, chiefly intrusion of Flemings. Visit of Ch. to his mother in gloomy castle, affectionate side of Chas. who at 25 took little sister away, returned to mother. Then came death of Maximilian, Fr. & Ch. candidates. Ch succession by no means welcome in Sp., wanted a resident sovereign, not regents b/y linking Sp. to Emp. would subvert Sp. interests. Rising & communes in Spain, very popular, nobles stood aside, not much common purpose. Junta submitted scheme of const. for monarchy of mod. type but achieved nothing. Int. side issue, French invad. Navarre & in defense of Pampluna soldier was wounded, studied lives of saints, Ch. needed N. offensive

army, Loyola founded Jesuits - p. int. f Counter Ref., charact. Spanish Nobles might have benefited by suppression f comm. rising, but Ch. came back w. Germ. soldiers & French gained - lost struggle f local indep. vs. centralized power.

Italian period, Fr I vs Ch V. 1520s. Fr. claimed Milan & Naples, territ. & Pope to some extent held balance. Victoria returned bringing survivors of Magellan's expedition, 1522.

Then news of Conq. of Mexico by Cortez, Count of Bourbon went on Sp. side (ee. of pers. rivalry w. France) Anglo-Burg. alliance renewed 1540s & Ch. Failure of attack on Marseilles, wd. cut Fr. ff from Medit. Ignominious failure epoch making battle of Pavia,

estab. supremacy of Sp. infantry in Europe, France taken prisoner. But as often in Ch v. his success turned to failure, Europe turned to dangerously strong. Possibly alliance fr v. states in Italy for Italians, if had been successful wd. have been important. Break down - (Battle of Marignano gave El Hung. to Turks while Europe struggling w. ref., sister of Ch V had married gallant L. f Hung.) Sack of Rome. Sp. troops reinforced by Germ. mercenaries, many Lutherans drifted S. from Lombardy - Bourbon could not hold them in check, he was killed at R + Orange who succeeded him had no control. Pope captured by Europe wd. outraged, Ch. unpopular.

Treaty of Barcelona w. Pope. At this time came Conq. of Peru by Pizzaro. Ch. alive to importance of colonial deve. No' others may not have been. Struggle ends w. so-called Ladies Peace, Cambrai May. - M^rg Savoy (King's mother) France shuns war from Italy. Crown w. Ion Crown of Lombardy, conse. at R 1530. Sardinia & Genoa was alienated by Fr & allies w. Chas. Allowed Sp. a port to use for troops to N Italy, banking of Genoa now available, union of Genoese & Sp. fleet - allowed Ch. to challenge Turk in Med. Spain, period 1533-1572. Less rivalry w. France, more w/ Turks in Med. One claim of Sp. = D. Ottoman Turk Task

later fell to junior branch, Farnes. Religious question, crus. impulse also Sp. trade hopefully spoiled by pirate chiefs & n. Africa, esp. one Barbarossa - for 8 yrs. effort to curb Barbary pirates, armada 1533 w. Tunis, Ch. personal leader. Taken, fleet destroyed, gr. success for Sp. Trouble again Fr & Sp. abt. Pope (Cf Trent) Span. pretends a papal policy a long time of war in many ways a victory for Span. church. A type of xt we may call Span xt, quite distinct from Luther or anglican. Birthplace, rigidly but, merciless, fanatic = C of T (3 inst, Jesuits, Inq., army) Great struggle vs. German Prot. Ch. in Germany - Philip was governing Sp. Ch. concluded suppression intro, C. of Augs. Unstable equilibrium. Abdic. Last speech to Netherlanders, end of public career when he began it as a boy. (See speech)

Went to Sp. laid down office for Don Philip. "A k. who recog. no superior." Retired but kept in touch w. purse affairs - little page boy. Don John b. 1545, know little about him - Brilliant youth. Mar. f Ch happy, n. Isab. f Portugal. Internal affairs, attitude to Cortes like & res to Parl. Give it power & resources as long as it agreed w. him. Already decline of local self govt. (Carroll Ruth this very important in any country). Councils of Z & I were developed, also Council for Indies, kept vicars from getting too much power - want of wise econ. direction Trade grew up w. Indies, looked like large trade & own. Cortes wanted to

Keep prices down but govt had to lay heavy taxes on industries & commerce. (cf mod Eng) Drove trade out of country, capt. by other nations. Money not wh. paid to foreign nations. Story of Span. trade & industry illuminating on what not to do. Relat. to R & Cols., members we'd no pay, tipped by King at end of session if they were good, a cut. 17% of money granted to Crown. Most serious problem: how to allocate vast domin. bet Fr & Ph. At one time Ch seems to have held idea of giving Ph. sole burden, but Fr opposed it. Partition. Ch died May 1660. Feuds soon max. Spain might have achieved gr. future if

could disentangle self from Imp. problems. Compact Sp. territory might have devel. Trade in new world & kept down Ned. pirates (a possible task). Actual: dictated future of Spain. Did not give neutr. & Ital. to Emp. but to Spain. Result: weakest Emp. by Duchy of Milan went to R. of Spain - Emp. should have been strengthened v. Turks. Sp. overburdened w. tasks in Italy & Neth (^{antag.} drew in Fr. & Eng). Eng channel lay bet. Sp. pos & land corridor was tho' Fr. Condemed Sp. to short period & gives a long period of decline & disaster.



W^m of Orange a hostage, overhead plots w. Prot. Death of Henry II led to versatile opportunist regency of C-de Med. :: France not strong RC ally.

Sp. again tried to put down piracy. Failure 1560 at Triple. Malva defended by Knights 1565.
